

From the General Secretary's Desk

Greetings to all our donors and well-wishers!

As always, 2022-2023 was yet another challenging year. Despite the remanence of the Covid pandemic, the organization witnessed all round incremental growth in our Delhi, Noida and Alwar chapters. We are happy to inform that this year we added a new chapter in Uttarakhand with centres in Dehradun and Almora. In Alwar, we initiated a goat rearing livelihood program. Our decade old journey in digital literacy entered an exciting new phase with the establishment of the Sapna IT College. Another branch of the Mahila Suraksha and Salah Kendra came up in the new police district of Bhiwadi.



In Delhi and Noida we ramped up our medical and nutritional support to the poor and indigent patients. Rehabilitation of unknown and homeless, some in coma - from the AIIMS Trauma Centre and Safdarjung Hospital in our shelter homes remained our priority.

The Skill Development Centre, Noida got a new lease of life after Religare decided to fund the centre under CSR. Our executive member Sujata Prasad volunteered to handhold the centre - injecting new life into the training cum livelihood program.

We enhanced our care giving including nutritional support to patients in our homes for the homeless in Alwar: Anandam Vijay Mandir, Dadikar and Anandmayee - a home for women. Our new 140 bedded home is on the verge of completion.

The Mahatma Gandhi Netralaya performed well. It was registered under the District Blindness Control Scheme (DBCS). However, there is an unmet need for a full-time ophthalmologist. Sustainability remains a critical issue.

The Computer Literacy Centre and BPO continue to do well, largely catering to the rural youth. Our dream to set up an IT college has fructified and we added a new course on Tally and GST.

Sapna Shikshalaya is committed to cause of quality education to underprivileged girls. A landmark achievement in this direction was the purchase of 4.5 bighas of land for constructing the school.

Environment conservation is high on our agenda. The two reservoirs constructed at Dadanpeer in Alwar have been a huge success story, considerably raising the water level and impacting the rural economy.

Resource mobilization continues to be a challenge. We believe that only good work will overcome this constraint. Nevertheless, we thank all our donors and the well-wishers who believe in our work and have stood solidly by us and we promise to stand high on three fundamental principles viz. discipline, integrity and sewa and relentlessly strive to be transparent and accountable.

I would also like to profusely thank our sewaks (social workers) who work tirelessly day-in and day-out. I deeply acknowledge the commitment and contribution of our esteemed members: Prof. Ranvir Singh, Vikas Gupta, Sujata Prasad and RRP Singh.

From the Secretary's Desk

Sapna, fulfilling the dreams of the deprived.

Durkheim, the French social philosopher argued that individuals in society are connected by social bonds that motivate to act in the interest of the group and work together to achieve common dreams.

India in its tryst with destiny carved out the dreams of its people in our constitution.

Sapna is committed to achieving those dreams for the deprived members of the society in an organic manner. "Sewa" is at the heart of Sapna's dreams. The year has been significant in terms of improvements to the environment at the places we work, continuous growth and developments to our systems and process and organisational learnings through education and training. Our Dadikar Centre at Alwar transformed into ecological centre with many innovative initiatives. A dry



and rocky area began to get green with massive tree plantation exercise and construction of check dams with the support of environmentally conscious donors. Two check dams that got constructed have created all weather lakes and raised the water table in the area. The impact has been tremendous with natural greening of the whole valley, rise of water table and over all social and economic impacts.

Sapna's information technology program for the youth, leap frogged into an IT College that offers specialized programs in IT based Accounting Skills, and other regular IT skill development programs that Sapna was already offering. Manipur University has affiliated Sapna IT College and tie up with Tally software providers of Bangalore has made it cutting edge oriented to market needs.

Sapna Shikshalaya is moving from strengthen to strength with emphasis is on knowledge, learning, attitude development, character building. Shikshalaya strives for excellence with perpetual thoughts and actions over what is taught and how it is taught to reach children in comprehensive manner.

Sapna has under taken some unique programs under its community development schemes. Toilet construction has been going on for some time now with toilets constructed during the year. At Dadikar, it was found that many poor do not have proper homes. They lived in thatched houses and leopard often visits and carries their live stocks. Sapna has undertaken construction of a house -a two room set. The first, Sapno ka ghar is under construction.

Sapna Netralaya with its regular outreach programs and surgeries is serving the communities in Alwar in a major way. It has established a name for itself with modern equipment and surgical facilities. Our Mahila Sewa and Suraksha program now has two centres - one at Alwar and the other at Bhiwadi. Bhiwadi Centre is in its growth and development stage and is picking up very fast.

Health Care Facilitation program at Delhi at major hospitals like JPNA Trauma Centre and Safdarjung Hospitals has been doing well. The demands always exceed the support that we can provide. It's our endeavour to connect more donors, allow greater involvement through internship and volunteering programs. An ambulance donated by Press Trust of India under their CSR program has enhanced our capabilities at Delhi.

Anandam Noida is in ship shape, ready to serve for short periods upto 15 patients. Support base both in kind and funds has shown an increase. Also, Skill Development centre Noida saw support coming from Religare under their CSR program.

At Delhi, the stream of patients in major hospitals keep on increasing and we keep working towards assisting them in whatever ways possible. We marvel at the the social service in health care rendered by AIIMS and Safdarjung Hospitals in the life of poor and deprived. We work with them playing our small part. Sapna, fulfilling the dreams of the deprived.






Health Care Facilitation Service at Delhi Hospitals

Sapna has been serving the patients of Delhi, NCR & Rajasthan for more than 18 years, and we are proud of our close ties with our community & hospitals such as AIIMS, the AIIMS Trauma Center, Safdarjung Hospital and local Alwar hospitals. Our approach to health care blends wellness, prevention and Sewa, with our long-standing tradition of nurturing the physical, mental and spiritual well-being of resourceless patients.

Our goal is to strengthen healthcare delivery capability through a multipronged approach that includes rehabilitation, providing nutrition, medicines and medical-ortho aids to the underprivileged and destitute patients.

Within our severe resource constraints, we have during the year managed to support **10** surgeries, **411** diagnostic tests and X Ray, CT scans, ECG, MRI, etc. and **148** medical equipment's such as wheelchairs, crutches, water beds, air mattresses and walking sticks. We also cremated **16** unknown patients from Safdarjung and Trauma Centre, AIIMS



- 59 patients sent to Sapna's home in Delhi/Alwar








Trauma Centre chief briefing Sapna volunteers regarding the different zones created for critical, semi critical and normal patients.





Safdarjung Hospital & Dharamshala



SAPNA evolved from a chance visit to the Safdarjung Hospital Dharamshala. It turned our

attention to the destitution faced by vulnerable, uninsured poor patients faced with exorbitant medical and other expenses far beyond their means. It also turned our attention to the negative public health environment that increases health burden and made us dream of an equity oriented, people centric model of health care capable of taking care of the morbidity and mortality of people who are not able to afford even elementary health care, nutritional support and medical attention.

Services provided at Safdarjung Hospital: Sapna's team of trained social workers assist poor patients lodged at the Dharamshala of Safdarjung hospital. We provide food and nutrition, medicines, money for diagnostic tests, surgical and post-surgical support, Funeral services, transportation support, rehabilitation, and a gamut of related support services. Every year we are increasing the scope of our help.

Medical expenses for treatment in Safdarjung Hospital: -

Treatment in Safdarjung Hospital is free. However, patients have to bear expenses for:

- medicines not available in the hospital;
- implants or replacements to be used in operations;
- diagnostic tests required urgently;
- ortho aid such as water beds, wheelchairs, special commode chairs, crutches, etc.;
- outstation patients undergoing prolonged treatment need to arrange for food and daily provisions;
- In addition, there are many unexpected expenses involved living away from home.

Outcome of Sapna's support

- 923 patients were helped with OPD protocol
- 39 burn patients & 165 cancer patients were extended help
- 7680 liters of milk was distributed to patients
- 16305 nutritious lunches were provided for patients
- 14843 dinner packets were distributed





All India Institute of Medical Sciences



AllMS is an apex multi-specialty hospital in Delhi with 25 clinical departments and 4 super specialty centres. Patients from Bihar, UP, Haryana, Rajasthan, West Bengal even as far as Nepal and Kerala come here for treatment.

In its own modest way, SAPNA, along with other like-minded individuals and organizations, extends support to the resourceless who seek treatment at AllMS. The orbit of support covers food and medicines. Chronically and acutely sick renal patients needing Hemodialysis or Peritoneal Dialysis are also supported on case to case basis. Six such patients were supported during the year.

Renal Care

SAPNA has progressively expanded support to renal patients after their transplant. What began with the support of 3-4 patients every month has grown to over 10-15 patients. We would specially like to acknowledge the amazing support received from Trikaal Foods & Agro Private Limited in running our renal care project.








Output

2. The Noida Chapter




Anandam Noida



Anandam, our Noida hospice has embraced the dire needs of severely sick patients: some homeless and others needing recuperative care and support. It also serves as a transit home for patients coming in and out of Alwar for follow ups and emergencies. We have 5 caregivers to serve our Noida Home.

During the year Andanam took care of 196 patients. We would like to acknowledge the support of Seth Madanla Pallriwala Foundation and Bakshi Sansar Chand Chhiber Memorial Trust for their gracious support.

Skill Development Centre

The skilling centre for women of Nithari village is located in a rented floor of a building in Sector 31. The idea behind creating this centre is to help women to take control of their lives and fight the poverty-cycle by making self-help groups and learning a viable skill to augment their earning. We are aiming to facilitate the creation of a cluster of micro-enterprises.

The project has been designed in a gender-sensitive way, cognisant of social norms and the constraints faced by women in their daily lives. It is aligned with the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals related to decent work and gender equality.

The courses are free of charge and at this point centre around tailoring and apparel-making in two batches of 10-12 women each. SAPNA is using a bottom-up approach by using members of the self-help groups to identify women in dire need of training. We have also integrated life skills such as communication, decision-making, strategic thinking in the skilling project to make them confident and self-sufficient

3. Dehradun Chapter (Sapna Sewa Kendra)

The Sapna Dehradun chapter was established in 2023 on the auspicious day of Basant Panchmi & Republic Day and named as "Sapna Sewa". The objective was to help elderly and unprivileged children with better accessibility to health care, legal system and education. The center has now 6 active workers. For digital empowerment and easy access to digital services, a Common Services Centre has been made operational. Legal assistance is also rendered by the Sapna Sewa.


General Welfare services were undertaken by distributing blankets to the needy.

4.PROJECT UDGAM: - BASIC COMPUTER LITERACY





FOR RURAL KUMAON SCHOOL CHILDREN


In August 2022 SAPNA initiated a basic computer literacy project at village Dinapani in rural Kumaon on the outskirts of Almora. The need was felt by Mrs Reshma Gangwar who spent eight months in the village and realized that the children were on the wrong side of the digital divide and the requirement of getting them

onto the digital highway was very strong.

She requested an NGO for some space in the complex and the same was provided. She asked family and friends for old computers and gradually was able to get around 13 of them. A local village girl with knowledge of computers was hired to train the classes.

An English teacher was also hired part time. Starting in Aug 2022 the progress till Mar 2023 has been very encouraging and children from class VI to class XII exposing them to various aspects of MS Office.

The children come from nearby villages like Maath, Gadholi, Matena, Mechodha. The first batch ran from Aug 22 to Nov 22 and covered eleven students who were awarded a certificate of completion. The second batch started Dec 22 and up to Mar 23 covered 12 students.










5. Alwar Chapter



Anandam-Vijay Mandir

Providing shelter to the homeless and chronically sick aligns with our ethical responsibility to care for the most vulnerable members of society. By providing a safe protected space - we demonstrate compassion, empathy, and a commitment to upholding basic human rights.

'Anandam' - A home for the homeless, was set up to support unidentified patients discharged from AIIMS Trauma Centre & Safdarjung Hospital Delhi on 5th January 2007 at Vijay Mandir. Shri Jagiram Ji, the first patient, has been with us since 2007. Most of the patients brought to Anandam are either homeless or suffer loss of memory due to some trauma or are comatose. Some are severely handicapped, and some have mental health issues.

Mission: Address the need of shelter and long-term care for the homeless, old, sick and destitute irrespective of their gender.

Our vision is of a world in which all such old, sick a destitute people can lead a dignified, active, healthy and secure life.

In Anandam Vijay Mandir inmates are cared for like elders and family members. The Social Workers attend to the daily needs which includes personal hygiene, food, medication and physiotherapy. A well-equipped ambulance is available for transporting the patients to Hospital in Alwar or to Jai Prakash Narayan Apex Trauma Centre or Safdarjung hospital in Delhi for scheduled OPD or in emergencies. Our social workers take care of:

- Complete personal hygiene
- Preventive action for bed sores
- Timely medication, nutrition and supplements
- Feeding liquid or solid diet
- Maintaining hygienic conditions

This is a painstaking job which requires lot of commitment and dedication—'Sewa' as we say. We also believe that their first right is to reside with their own families if possible. Hence, our aim is to give them medical and supportive care till they are capable of being rehabilitated with their families. In this way, Sapna has been instrumental in restoring several sick and infirm persons to their families.



Anandam has three centres in Vijay Mandir & Dadikar in Alwar and a short stay home in Noida, UP. In view of increasing number of battered and extremely vulnerable homeless women, we carved out Anandmayee - an exclusive home for homeless women at Vijay Mandir. From Jagatramji, our first patient in 2007, the Anandam family has grown to 110, as on 31st March 2023.





Anandam residents at international Day of Older Person at Vijay Mandir






Anandam- Dadikar



Anandam, Dadikar was inaugurated on 18th November, 2017. This facility has a capacity of 70 homeless and presently it houses 65. The construction of the building was supported by Hindustan Zinc Limited under CSR. This facility houses patients who have recuperated and do not need much treatment. The Government of Rajasthan has designated it as the 'Old Age Home' for Alwar district.

Anandmayee- A home for homeless women



Anandmayee - A home for the homeless women was established at Vijay Mandir on 21st October, 2019. The home provides a safe nurturing space to women who are victims of violence, trafficking, sexual abuse, and other forms of severe trauma.

This year 22 such women joined Anandmayee. 5 were restored to their family after counseling the women and the family members.

6. Mahatma Gandhi Netralaya, Alwar



SAPNA began provide high-quality eye care to the underserved rural areas of Alwar in 2007. In 2010, a Vision Centre was set up at Vijay Mandir. was This followed the construction of Mahatma Gandhi Netralaya which located in the village Kaduki, Alwar stands as a beacon of hope for the elderly & poor in the region. It became operational on 25th August, 2017. Our primary mission is to

provide secondary-level eye care services to those who cannot afford treatment at private hospitals or are unable to access eye care due to low penetration in rural areas.

We are indebted to the generous support of late Ms. Prabha Singh and the CSR initiative of Coal India Ltd., which made the construction of this state-of-the-art hospital possible.

Mahatma Gandhi Netralaya consists of a team of two full-time optometrists under the supervision of Pramukh Sewak, two part-time experienced surgeons, one part-time anesthetist, and an OT assistant.

Our hospital's walk-in OPD services are available from Monday to Saturday, from 9 AM to 5 PM, with a nominal token fee of Rs. 50. Once or twice a week, we conduct cataract surgeries to restore vision to those in need. In 2022-23, 5500 people were examined in OPD and 863 cataract surgeries were performed.

Outreach Eye Camps

Our commitment to reach the poorest and elderly in the community who cannot access our hospital has led to the weekly outreach eye camps held every Sunday in villages. These camps offer free eye check-ups, medications, and eyeglasses to those in need. For individuals identified with cataract during these camps, our hospital provides free transportation to and from the facility, where there cataract surgeries are performed at no cost. The day after surgery, they are safely transported back to the camp location.

In the last financial year, we organized 42 outreach eye camps, identifying and providing treatment to those who needed it the most. Total 7695 peoples were examined in outreach camps; 495 cataract surgeries were performed successfully. Our effort resulted in bringing light and clarity to the lives of 495 individuals & their families who had been living in darkness. Furthermore, we distributed a total of 2,635 eyeglasses, empowering individuals with improved vision and a brighter outlook on life.

We are grateful to ICICI Foundation for providing us with high tech. eye equipment. We are thankful to Escorts Ltd and Dhirendra & Shanta Mehta Foundation for providing financial assistance to conduct outreach camps and surgeries. Special thanks to Shri. Vikas Gupta our executive member & director of MGN, and his team for organizing these eye camps.

Mahatma Gandhi Netralaya remains steadfast in its mission to provide comprehensive eye care services to the poor and needy in the Alwar region. Our dedication to the cause, supported by the generous contributions of individuals and organizations, continues to bring light and hope to those who would otherwise be left in the shadows. As we move forward, we remain committed to expanding our services and reaching even more individuals in need of eye care.

Dhano, a 60-year-old woman from village Bahndwara, Alwar whose world had gradually faded into darkness due to cataract attended our outreach eye camp held at Kasba Dehra, where her journey to recovery and newfound hope began.

Our medical team performed a thorough eye examination. It was immediately evident that her left eye was affected by cataract, leaving her with no vision and only a vague sense of hand movements. Even her right eye struggled with diminished vision, casting a shadow over her daily life.

On the 12th of February 2023, Dhano underwent a cataract surgery, performed with precision using the advanced phaco technique. The surgery was a resounding success, her vision improved to 6 by 24, and she could now see the world around her with remarkable clarity.

Dhano's heart brimmed with joy and gratitude. She was not just seeing; she was experiencing the world anew, and it filled her with indescribable happiness.

Two weeks after her surgery, Dhano returned for a follow-up. Her vision had continued to improve, and her eyesight was now clear. Dhano proudly shared how she could now engage in household chores without any assistance. The need for someone to guide her every step had become a thing of the past.

Her journey from darkness to light has not only restored her vision but also her confidence, independence, and hope for the future. We remain committed to bringing light into the lives of individuals like Dhano and will continue our efforts to transform vision impairment into visions of hope.



7. Education




In 2010, "Pankhuri- Support the girl child" programme was conceptualized and piloted in Vijay Mandir, Alwar. The idea was to support the education of girls from economically disadvantaged families of neighboring villages of Vijay Mandir to get quality education.

The objectives are:

- to support deprived and marginalized girl children in receiving quality education in good schools of Alwar; and
- to find financial supports for each child to meet the cost of education.

The girls in Pankhuri program come from marginalized families. Most of the girls covered under this program are from underprivileged families from a nearby Village Kaduki. Though, economic condition of the family is one of the important parameters for selection, girls who fail to access quality school is essential criteria for selection. The girls have been admitted in two reputed schools of Alwar adjacent to our Centre Vijay Mandir named



National Academy and V.L Memorial School and are being provided all round support in their education.

Presently our program covers a total of 13 girls. Individual sponsors support their fees, food, uniform, books and transportation. The Program Coordinator monitors the academic progress of the girls in the school and provides evening classes at Vijay Mandir which supports the girls to complete their homework, followed by nutrition and shramdan.

Quality, Flexible & Relevant Learning

Changing lives of underprivileged girls through education:

Sapna Shikshalaya was established in 2015 to provide quality, relevant & flexible education, and holistic support to underprivileged girls in the vicinity. What began with 19 girls in 2015 has blossomed and is currently educating 275 girls from 17 villages around Vijay Mandir. The school is a beacon of hope for underprivileged girls who receive education they might not have access to otherwise. These girls hail from economically disadvantaged backgrounds and have found a nurturing environment that fosters their academic growth and personal development.

Sapna Shikshalaya has team of 18 dedicated teachers under the watchful guidance of our Principal and educational motivators. The school operates from 7.30 am to 12.30 pm during the summer and from 8.00 am to 01.00 pm in winter, ensuring a conducive learning environment for all. The class wise breakup of girls is mentioned below:

The annual expenditure on the education of one girl child is Rs. 24000. To impart a sense of ownership and responsibility, a token amount of Rs. 500 for primary section and Rs. 800 for senior section is charged monthly from each parent. The school raises the remaining amount from individual & institutional donors. Notably, girls from single-parent households are exempt from this fee. This model ensures the continued operation of the school and its mission to uplift the underprivileged.

Support to girls:

A significant portion of our students, approximately 90%, utilize school transportation for their daily commute, ensuring accessibility to education. Our commitment to holistic development is evident through the provision of sports facility, yoga, and music classes to all students.

To enhance the understanding of subjects, we have integrated two state-of-the-art smart classrooms that utilize audio-visual aids. Computer classes become compulsory for all girls after the 3rd grade, preparing them for the digital age.

Recognizing the importance of nutrition, we provide substantial support to combat anemia and malnutrition among our students. This investment in their well-being has yielded positive results, fostering both physical and mental development. Our

well-stocked library serves as a gateway for girls to explore the wider world and enrich their knowledge. Additionally, we celebrate festivals and events with enthusiasm, instilling a sense of cultural pride and belonging.

Parent-Teacher and SMC Meetings:

At Sapna Shikshalaya, we value communication and collaboration. Therefore, every quarter, we organize Parent-Teacher Meetings and School Management Committee (SMC) gatherings. These forums enable us to update parents on their children's progress and gather their valuable feedback.

Community Engagement through village visit:

Our teachers conduct monthly visits to the girls' villages, engaging with their parents and other family members. During these visits, we speak with parents about the importance of supporting their daughters' education and fostering a positive environment at home. We have seen wonderful results as more parents have started actively participating in their daughters' educational journey.

Recognizing the significance of safety and hygiene, we have initiated the construction of toilets in the homes of girls who lack access. This year, we successfully built 18 toilets (total 36 till date) in the homes of our students, ensuring their dignity, comfort, and safety.












Investing in Teacher's through regular training:

community and our mission. Our vision is to make Sapna Shikshalaya into a center of excellence.

 Opening of Sukanya Samridhi Khata: One of our most significant achievements this year has been the opening of Sukanya Samridhi Accounts for 118 girls. This initiative is designed to ensure a secure and prosperous future for our students. By encouraging parents to deposit funds regularly, we aim to provide a strong financial foundation for these young girls, enabling them to pursue their dreams without constraints.

As we move into the future, we remain committed to our mission of transforming the lives of underprivileged girls and their families. We will continue to expand our reach, improve our facilities, and enhance the quality of education and support we provide.

8. Digital Literacy

Computer Literacy Center (CLC)




"E-learning at the door steps"

As you are aware that the rural youth is not in a position to access quality computer education and for many accessing educations in some of the high tech. institutes is beyond their means. They are also hesitant and unwilling to leave their villages due to family circumstances and background.

Given this backdrop, Sapna started Computer Literacy Center in 2010 with the primary objective of imparting digital skills to rural youth and reducing the digital gap prevalent in our society. Over the past thirteen years, our organization has been endeavoring to bridge the digital divide. We are proud to share our achievements, impact, and future plans with you.

The Computer Literacy Center at Vijay Mandir, Alwar, is one of our flagship projects. The center is well-equipped with a computer lab with 20 workstations and a spacious classroom for teaching







that accommodates 25 students at a time.

We offer three-months certificate course RSCIT (Rajasthan State Certificate in Information Technology) affiliated to Vardhman Mahaveer Open University. The course focuses on MS Office, basic hardware troubleshooting, Internet and Networking, and basic software applications.

Each batch consists of 20 students. Every batch trains for two hours daily with one hour of theory classes and one hour of practical session. We have two qualified teachers who mentor our youth diligently. Separate batches for girls are organized to ensure a comfortable learning environment.

We believe that education should be accessible to all. To this end, we have kept our course fees affordable, allowing every youth in the region to enrol themselves without financial constraints. To enhance the learning experience, we utilize audio-video visuals, and our strict attendance policy, with a target of 95%, ensures that students stay committed to their education. Those with less than 95% attendance are not allowed to participate in the final exams.

Continuous assessment is crucial for skill development. We conduct weekly tests to evaluate students' progress and identify areas of improvement.

Impact

Since our inception, we have successfully trained 1450 youth, and today, we can say that 40% of these individuals are gainfully employed. In year 2022-23,

we trained 161 youth, comprising 110 boys and 51 girls, furthering our commitment to gender equality in education.

Future Plan

As we look ahead, we are excited to announce our next endeavor: the establishment of an IT College. This institution will offer certificate, diploma, and degree courses such as DCA, PGDCA, Accounts & GST, B.SC, and BCA. Our aim is to provide comprehensive education opportunities to the rural youth of Alwar District, enabling them to pursue rewarding careers in the IT sector.

9. Livelihood

SAPNA IT Consultancy



"Employment at the door steps"

Sapna runs an ambitious rural Business Process Outsourcing (BPO) initiative with a clear mission: to provide gainful employment opportunities to IT skilled youth residing in rural areas. This transformative venture was started in 2012.

The BPO has worked with prestigious organizations such as INFOSYS, India Post, Forest Department, Punj Lloyd, and Yashi Consultancy in the past. In 2018, an IT consultancy platform named Sapna IT Consultancy was established to undertake commercial engagements. Currently, Sapna IT Consultancy is engaged in comprehensive back-office services for a prominent American pharmaceutical company.

Till date we have engaged 145 part-time data entry operators from neighboring villages on a project basis. This initiative has not only provided a golden opportunity for the rural youth to gain meaningful employment but has also paved the way for their personal and professional growth within their local communities.

Last year, 10 IT Executives and 15 Data Entry Operators were employed. Sapna's BPO remains vigilant in its pursuit of new and exciting business opportunities, eager to continue its impactful journey of rural economic development.

Goat Rearing Program

In March 2022, we initiated the Goat Rearing Livelihood Program with the objective of improving the annual income of impoverished families. This program was undertaken in partnership with BRY Air Pvt Ltd under their CSR initiative. The primary goal was to identify and support 50 economically disadvantaged families in Dadikar village and neighboring villages by providing them with 2 goats each.

To ensure transparency and fair distribution, a committee was formed to verify the eligibility of beneficiary families. Once verified, the families entered into agreements with Sapna, agreeing to return the first two offspring to the organization.

The distribution of goats to these 50 families was carried out in two phases. In the first phase, 25 families received goats on 26th April 2022, and the remaining 25 families were provided goats in the second phase on 3rd March 2023. To maintain the well-being of the goats, two Pashu Sakhis were appointed to oversee the program. Periodic veterinary check-ups were conducted by a qualified veterinary doctor, and essential vaccinations were administered to ensure the health of all the goats.

The program has had a significant impact on the beneficiary families. Several families have seen their goat herds grow beyond the initial two goats, resulting in increased income. Additionally, these goats have provided families with a regular source of milk, benefiting both children and the elderly.

Remarkably, some elderly individuals who were previously confined to their homes have now started venturing into the nearby jungle to feed and care for their goats. This newfound activity has not only improved their physical well-being but also brought a sense of purpose to their lives.

Looking ahead, we plan to identify and support an additional 50 families in the coming year, continuing our mission to uplift impoverished communities through goat rearing.



10. Community Development

Sapno Ka Ghar: Construction of Individual homes





Sapno Ka Ghar, a project initiated by us, was launched in February 2023 with a mission to provide shelter to impoverished families who either lacked a home or lived in a dilapidated one.

We selected Ratan Lal & Ramawati from Dadikar and started construction of the first Sapno Ka Ghar. The first Sapno Ka Ghar will have total floor area of 400 square feet. It includes two rooms (each measuring 143 square feet), an open area. The construction is being executed with meticulous attention to quality and durability, guaranteeing the longevity of the new home. The total expenditure incurred on construction till March 2023 was Rs. 1.89 Lakhs.

Acknowledgments: this would have not been possible without the unwavering support of EC Hope Group (Dubai), who funded the construction. We express our heartfelt gratitude to EC Hope Group & Shri Nandi Vardhan Mehta for making this project a reality and for helping us make a positive difference in the lives of those in need.

About Beneficiaries: Ratan is 55 years old. Ramwati is 45. They have two children: 8 year old daughter named Monika and 9 year old son named Monu who attend a government school in Dadikar and are in class 4. Ratan is a daily wage labourer. He works 15 to 20 days every month as the family's sole provider.

Ramwati handles household chores and animal work. As part of the Goat Rearing Livelihood Project, Sapna gave her two goats. Since Covid began, we have been providing them with ration kits. As part of our initiative Sapno ka Ghar, we are working to construct their home so that they are able to lead secure life in a safe space.

Construction of Individual Toilet:

For centuries open defecation has been a way of life in the villages. Open defecation poses significant social. economic and environmental challenges. Openly left human waste helps in breeding and transmission of pathogens, which help carry diseases and infections. The problem is most acute for children, women and young girls.

A household toilet is the most important aspect of sanitation. It not only restores dignity, privacy, safety, and social status but also has strong bearings on the aspects of child mortality, maternal health, primary education, gender equity, environmental sustainability, and overall improvement of quality of life.

To promote hygiene and to get over the traditional mind set, a project for construction of individual toilets was conceived and implemented in 2015. In the first year, seven toilets were constructed in village Kaduki. In 2022-23 year total 28 toilets were constructed of which 18 were in household of girls studying in Sapna Shikshalaya & 10 were in the house of villagers.

Till date we have constructed 155 toilets in villages such as Kaduki, Dehra, Bala Dehra, Shahpur, Thekra, Nangli Mushi, Todiyar , Chandoli, & Dadikar.

Desiccant Rotors International Pvt Ltd and Bry Air (Asia) Pvt Ltd under their CSR program provide financial support for this project. The cost of each toilet is approximately Rs.50,000. Rs.5,000 is a token contribution from beneficiaries to promote ownership in the program.









Jan Sewa Kendra (E-Mitra Center)



In order to assist the villagers in obtaining their credentials at a reasonable cost, Sapna opened an e-mitra centre in Vijay Mandir in 2010. E-Mitra is a comprehensive e-governance programme of the Government of Rajasthan (GoR), which is being implemented using Public-Private Partnership (PPP) model for the convenience and transparency of citizens in getting various services from the Government and Private Sectors under a single roof at their doorstep using an e-platform.

Ration Cards, Voter I Cards, Pan Cards, Bhamasah Cards, Labor Cards, Pension Forms, Caste Certificates, Income Certificates, Residence Certificates, Life Certificates, Police Verification Forms, and Scholarship Forms are among the services offered by the centre. Last year 258 caste certificate, 233 residence certificate, 214 Bhamashah Card, 91 ration cards, 86 life certificate & 5 police verification certificates were issued. The expenditure incurred on the project was Rs. 1,59,978.





11. Environment & Water Conservation:



Sapna Nursery


Gandhi's love for nature and emphasis on "cleanliness as next to Godliness" has been deeply embodied in the work culture of Sapna. The commitment of Sapna to environment protection and cleanliness is of a very high order. In keeping with its deep commitment to environment protection, planting trees and creating gardens, Sapna had started its own nursery in 2017 with more than 1000 plants.

The aim is to grow and develop our own plants cost-effectively for our use and for sale at a very reasonable cost to the villagers of the area. More than 5500 saplings have been planted in the area over the years. Despite the extremities of weather and arid soil, the majority of plants have survived. Sapna Nursery encourages people of the area to plant trees and provides plants

at a nominal cost. In 2022 –23 total 1500 plants were planted and 500 plants were distributed.

Two forests, namely DRI Forest at Vijay Mandir and the Bry Air Forest in the village of Dadikar, are being developed by Sapna. Both forests are a CSR effort by Desiccant Rotors

Pvt. Ltd. and Bry Air (Asia) Pvt. Ltd. respectively. In each forest, 500 trees will be planted. 250 trees have already been planted, and the remaining trees will follow soon.

Water Conservation (Construction of Check Dam)





In the pursuit of water conservation, Sapna embarked on a significant project in the village of Dadikar in 2020. The primary objective of this project was to collect rainwater effectively and raise the water levels in the region. This initiative aimed to address the long-standing water scarcity in the area.

First Check Dam (Reservoir 1): As part of this endeavor, two earthen check dams were constructed. In December 2021, the first check dam underwent a cementation process, generously supported by Bry Air Pvt Ltd under CSR contribution of Rs.17.50 lakhs. The cementation work of Dam was successfully completed in April 2022, and it was inaugurated on April 26th, 2022.

The impact of this check Dam after cementation project was remarkable. We also did some deepening work in the Dam. After the rain a significant amount of water collected in the dam. The above image shows the substantial increase in water retention post-cementation. Interviews with villagers revealed that borewells and ponds that had remained dry for many years were now replenished with water. This substantial water availability proved to be a boon for the villagers, enabling them to cultivate crops such as wheat, barley, and mustard in their land.

Second Check Dam (Reservoir 2): Inspired by the success of the first dam, Sapna requested Dessicant Rotors International Private Limited for the construction of a second check dam. This new project was situated in front of "Anandam" at Dadikar and Dessicant Rotors International generously sanctioned Rs. 12.50 lakhs for its construction.

The second dam, measuring 250 feet in length, 10 feet in height, and 4 feet in width, was completed and inaugurated on March 3rd, 2023. Initial observations indicate a substantial collection of water in this dam, raising hopes for a significant increase in water levels in the near future.

The ongoing success of these check dam projects highlights the importance of collaborative efforts of NGOs, Institutional Donors & villagers in addressing critical issues such as water scarcity. We remain grateful to Bry Air Pvt Ltd and Dessicant Rotors International Private Limited for their unwavering support. We look forward to the continued success of these water conservation efforts and their contribution to the sustainable development of the region.







12. Empowerment of Women

Introduction of MSSK

Since December 1, 2008, SAPNA is partnering with local police and Department of Women and Child in Alwar, Rajasthan to run a guidance and protection centre for women known as the 'Mahila Suraksha Evam Salah Kendra (MSSK)'. The MSSK is a holistic redressal centre for women providing support to women facing violence by way of:

- assisting them to negotiate their way through the Criminal Justice System;
- settling disputes through alternative dispute resolution mechanisms;
- rehabilitation to women survivors of violence; and
- providing medical and legal aid, psycho-social support, shelter, economic rehabilitation, and any other relief required.

The counsellors listen patiently to victims problem. Every case is unique and requires a different resolution strategy. Every strategy depends on the gravity and nature of grievance. Need of survivor and confidentiality are the two main core values on which our work is based.





Comparison of receipts 2022-23 vs 2021-22




