## From the General Secretary's Desk

### Greetings to our donors and well-wishers!

We feel blessed and humbled having completed 21 years of “Sewa”- an incredible journey that began in 2004. This year in Delhi we initiated support to the growing numbers of cancer patients. The Computer Literacy Centre in Noida saw increasing number of children wanting to learn about computers. In Alwar, we made headway in vermicompost production at the Agricultural Resource Centre (ARC) in Dadhikar. Dadhikar village saw solar lighting, and we added two more “Sapno ka Ghar.” The “Rural Immersion Program” for management trainees and senior bureaucracy was another pioneering initiative.

NGO Sapna witnessed incremental growth in all the verticals. In Delhi we increased medical and nutritional support to the poor and indigent patients in AIIMS Trauma Centre and Safdarjung Hospital. Rehabilitation of unknown and homeless, some in coma and mostly sick to Anandam, Anandmayee and other shelter homes remains an important responsibility. The Skill Development Centre, Noida got a new lease of life when the trainers took it upon themselves to become commercially sustainable.

In Alwar, we are committed to caregiving of 150 patients in Anandam and Anandmayee. The new 150 bedded home for the homeless men was completed in March 2024.

Sapna Shikshalaya is committed in its journey of changing lives. The numbers are increasing every year, indicating our growing presence in the area. The capacity building training has ushered a new enthusiasm for our teachers. We are now diligently working on the construction of school, after having procured the land.

The Mahatma Gandhi Netralaya performed around a thousand four hundred surgeries – a 40% increase from the previous year. Sustainability, however, remains a critical issue.

Our dream to set up a full-fledged IT college is on track. The tie up with Tally and introduction of a new “Tally cum GST Course” was a step forward. The award of a certificate of excellence for outstanding performance by Tally Education is a matter of pride for us.

Construction of check dams to mitigate the problem of water stress in the area is high on the agenda. We continue to construct quality toilets and plant trees.

Resource mobilization must keep pace with expanding work. We believe that only good work can overcome this challenge. We thank all the donors and well-wishers who believe in our work and have stood solidly by us. We stand committed on our three founding principles viz. discipline, integrity and Sewa and relentlessly strive to be transparent and accountable.

I profusely thank the Sewaks including teachers, Pramukh Sewaks and Pradhan Sewak for their hard work and unflinching commitment. I deeply acknowledge the contribution of the esteemed members of the Governing Body who repose faith and trust and stand solidly with us.

## From the Secretary's Desk

Sapna has come a long way in its mission to serve the poor, the sick, and the destitute. Staying true to its vision of realizing the dreams of the underprivileged, as enshrined in the Constitution of India, the organization continues to meet and exceed the expectations of its stakeholders.

This year has been one of challenges, growth, and notable accomplishments. The progress we've made will undoubtedly pave the way for even greater service offerings and impact in the years ahead.

Two significant achievements of the year stand out. The first is the greening of Dadikar Valley. With the support of Bry-Air, Sapna has completed the construction of three check dams, which have created sizable water bodies and raised the water table in the area. Alongside these efforts, massive reforestation activities have been carried out, with trees planted on the check dams and surrounding areas. The valley has already begun to show visible signs of greening. Community participation in this project has been heartening, reinforcing the success of this initiative.

The second major achievement is the acquisition of land for Sapna Shikshalaya in Bala Dehra village. Education, alongside healthcare, has been a cornerstone of Sapna's efforts, particularly the focus on girl child education. The growing popularity of Sapna Shikshalaya and the increasing number of students necessitated the need for a permanent, convenient location. With the acquisition of well-located land, we are closer to fulfilling our dream. Construction is set to begin soon, with funding for the building already approved by the Rajasthan Industrial Corporation.

Our flagship program, Anandam, which spans locations in Vijaymandir, Kaduki, Dadikar, and Noida, has continued to evolve. Each location now serves a specialized role: Vijaymandir (Anandmayee) is dedicated to female inmates, Kaduki houses male patients undergoing long-term treatment, Dadikar functions as an old-age home and permanent residence for some of our beneficiaries, and Noida is a short-stay home where patients receive treatment at AIIMS and Safdarjung Hospitals. This year, we saw the Kaduki facility become fully operational, an important milestone in our ongoing capacity-building efforts.

At Sapna Shikshalaya, the children are thriving. We have established regular teacher training programs, complemented by weekly inputs and an internal and external evaluation process. Our senior students will soon be taking their board exams, and we have tied up with other institutions to facilitate their participation. The process for school recognition is also underway. Skill Development Centers have made remarkable progress. With support from the Tata Group, we've established a full-fledged Computer Centre in Noida under the Sapna IT College, with 20 computers now fully operational. Our IT programs in Alwar have also gained traction, with a growing number of admissions. The Skill Development Centre for Women in Noida continues to expand its activities, providing training and practical experience in designing and stitching, thanks to ongoing support from our partners.

Finally, the Sapna Homes for the Poor initiative, which began last year, continues to gain positive attention. This year, we built one house and handed it over to an eligible family, along with two goats for their livelihood. Two more homes are in the planning stages, and the community response has been overwhelmingly supportive.

Thank you to all our stakeholders, volunteers, and partners for their unwavering support. Together, we will continue to work towards a brighter and more inclusive future.

## From the Desk of Pradhan Sewak

### Greetings to All!

At Sapna, our mission of *sewa* — selfless service — continues to guide every step we take. This year, our work has once again reaffirmed our belief that compassion, transparency, and accountability are the true pillars of meaningful change. We remain committed to serving the poorest of the poor with dignity, empathy, and unwavering dedication.

Each day, Sapna reaches more than 1,500 beneficiaries through its programs in health, education, livelihood, shelter, and care for the elderly and destitute. Every effort is driven by our core value — to serve those who need it the most.

This year marked many new beginnings and milestones. We started Sapna IT College, opening new digital horizons for rural youth. We completed the construction of a 140-bedded home for the homeless at village Kaduki, providing safe shelter and dignity to those once without a roof. Feeding India is supporting the provision of dry rations for patients at *Anandam* and *Anandamayee*, as well as for the girls at *Sapna Shikshalaya*. They are also providing cooked meals to poor patients staying at *Safdarjung Dharamshala*. This partnership has significantly strengthened our feeding programs and helped us reach more people in need.

Under the Sapna Ka Ghar initiative, two new homes have been completed this year and 5th home is under construction — each one a testament to hope and care. In village Dadikar, the installation of solar street lights has improved safety, especially during night hours. We also organized one of our largest health camps at Nithari, Noida, benefiting nearly 800 women and girls with free health check-ups and medicines.

Our eye care program achieved its highest number of eye camps and cataract surgeries this year — restoring sight and bringing light to many lives. We have also started supporting cancer patients at Safdarjung Hospital and AIIMS, extending our care to those fighting serious illness.

Through all these initiatives, our purpose remains steadfast — to serve with complete dedication and sincerity, ensuring that every rupee and every effort reach to those who need it the most.

### Transparency and Accountability

We continue to uphold strong governance and ethical financial practices. Over 90% of our payments, including salaries, are made through bank transfers, and all employees receive PF and ESI benefits. Monthly salary statements are displayed publicly to ensure transparency. For our donors, we maintain open communication through reports, newsletters, and visits, ensuring clarity and trust in how every contribution is used.

We express heartfelt thanks to all our donors, well-wishers, local administration, doctors, social workers, and our team of 136 dedicated staff members. Your trust and support strengthen our resolve to keep serving the poor with compassion, accountability, and integrity.

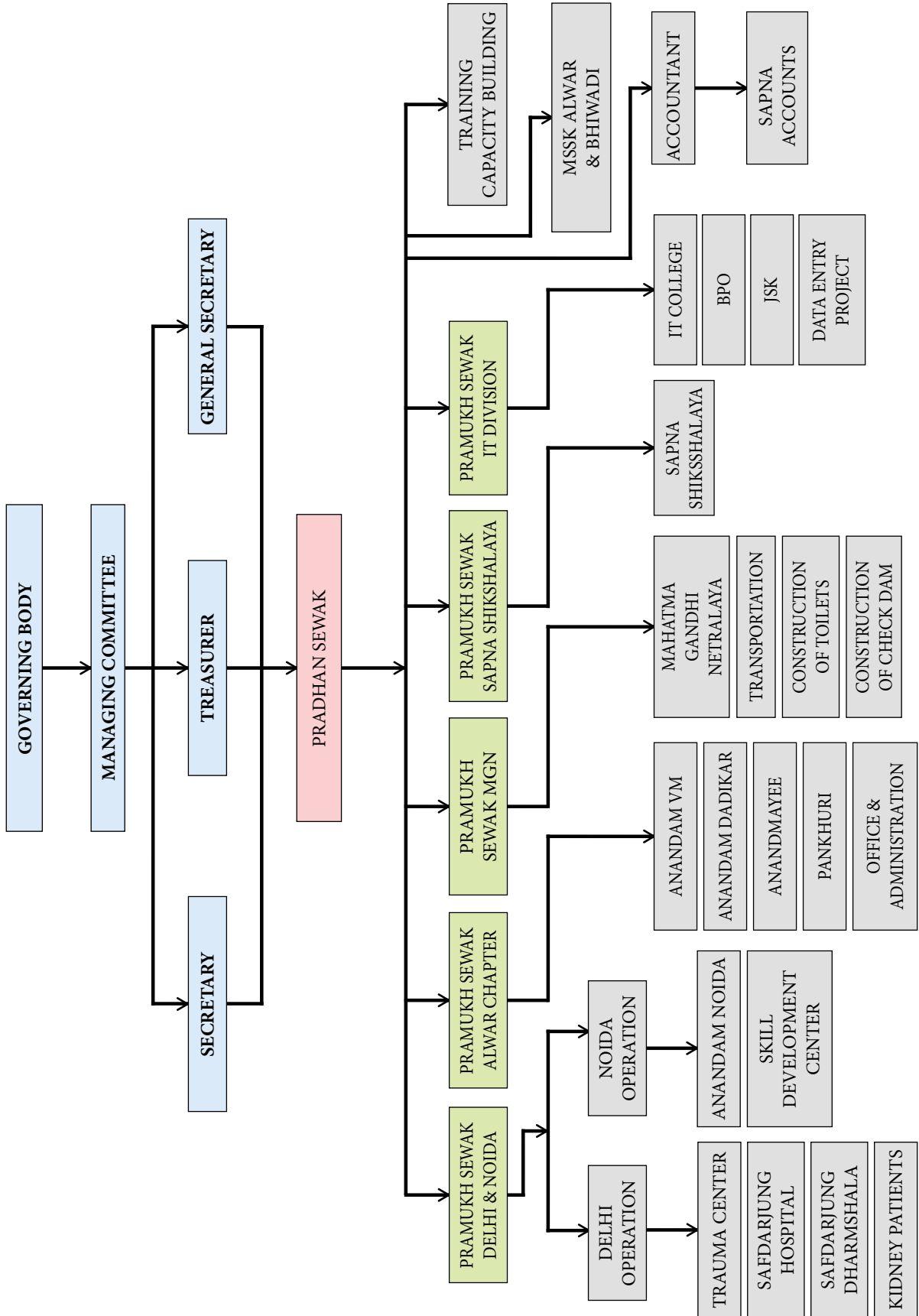

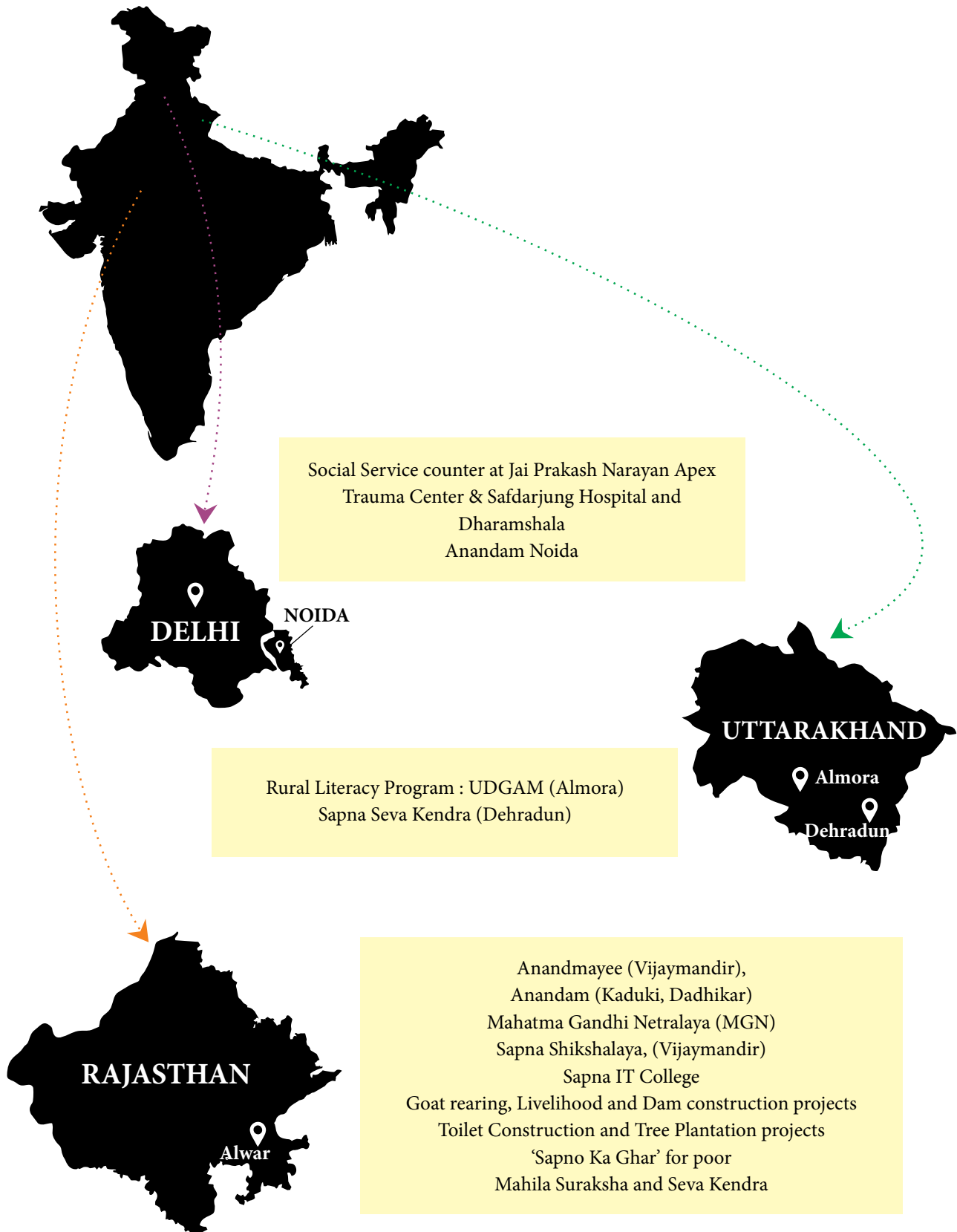

# Health Care Facilitation Service at Delhi Hospitals

**Summary:** Sapna – a dream that began in 2004 with a small step and a big mission – has been serving the poor, sick, and destitute for more than 21 years. What started with just Rs. 10,000 and a simple act of distributing milk and vegetables at the Dharamshala of Safdarjung Hospital has today grown into a comprehensive healthcare support initiative. Now, in 2025, we continue this sewa with full dedication, spending nearly Rs. 80–90 lakhs every year in just these two hospitals (AIIMS Trauma Center and Safdarjung Hospital) to serve sick, poor, and needy patients.

Over the years, our work has expanded from providing meals to patients, to supporting critical medicines, dialysis, surgeries, implants, and diagnostic tests. We also facilitate ambulance services, distribute orthopaedic aids and medical equipment, assist patients in obtaining OPD cards, and extend care to cancer and kidney patients. For unknown and abandoned patients, we have taken on the responsibility of rehabilitation and performing their last rites with dignity. Sapna now operates Social Service Counters at the Jai Prakash Narayan Apex Trauma Center (AIIMS) and Safdarjung Hospital, working closely with the Medical Social Welfare Offices. A dedicated team of 10 social workers, guided by our Pramukh Sewak, ensures that help reaches those who need it most.

Within our limited resources during 2024–25, we were able to support 35 surgeries amounting to ₹21 lakhs for poor and needy patients, 542 diagnostic tests including X-rays, CT scans, ECGs, MRIs, etc. Moreover, medical equipment distribution in FY 2024 – 25 amounted to 70 wheelchairs, 4 crutches, 21 suction machines, 16 air mattresses, 10 dignified cremations for unknown patients from Safdarjung Hospital and AIIMS Trauma Center and 38 walkers to the destitute patients.

Though the needs are immense and resources limited, Sapna continues to stand by the most vulnerable, committed to easing their suffering and serving them with dignity and compassion.

## I. JPNA Trauma Centre of AIIMS

The Jaiprakash Narayan Apex Trauma Center of AIIMS is a multi-specialty hospital in Delhi with 25 clinical departments and 4 super-specialty centres. Patients from Bihar, UP, Haryana, Rajasthan, West Bengal even as far as Nepal and Kerala come here for treatment. In its own modest way, SAPNA, along with other like-minded individuals and organizations, extends support to the resourceless who seek treatment at AIIMS. The orbit of support covers food and medicines. Chronically and acutely sick renal patients needing Haemodialysis or Peritoneal Dialysis are also supported on case-to-case basis. Six such patients were supported during the year.



### **Our Work: Critical areas for unknown/unclaimed trauma victims**

At the Jai Prakash Narayan Apex Trauma Centre, NGO Sapna continues to extend critical support to unknown and unclaimed trauma victims through its Social Service Counter. Managed by 2 trained social workers under a Pramukh Sewak, in close coordination with the Medical Social Welfare Officer, the counter actively identifies and assists patients and their attendants in navigating the treatment process.

Our services include providing medicines and consumables, ambulance and transportation support, nutritional assistance, travel fare, clothing, diagnostic tests, surgeries, and rehabilitation. In cases where patients are unable to recall or identify their homes immediately, they are admitted to Sapna's hospice in Noida. For long-term shelter, they are transferred to our homeless care facility Anandam – A Home for the Homeless in Alwar. The centre also distributes essential orthopaedic aids such as wheelchairs, crutches, walkers, and suction machines to improve patients' quality of life. Additionally, we provide a General Kit containing basic personal care items such as a toothbrush, hair oil, cream, and comb.

During 2024–25, a total of 448 patients were supported. Of these, 109 were facilitated to return to their hometowns, 59 were reunited with their families, and 35 were transferred to Sapna's homes in Delhi and Alwar. In FY 2024 – 25 blankets and 197 general kit were distributed. This number is followed by other major ortho-aids distribution includes wheel chair (36), Walker (23) and X-ray (22). Below is the detailed account of ortho – aids distribution for FY 2024 – 25.

On the occasion of Holi, on 14th March 2025, Sapna arranged and deployed a team of 39 volunteers to assist in handling emergency cases. The volunteers supported the medical staff with tasks such as facilitating CT scans and X-rays for patients and transferring patients on gurneys to their designated locations within the hospital compound.

To ensure effective coordination in emergency situations, all trained volunteers were divided into pairs of two, allowing for better implementation of the plan on the ground. In total, several emergency cases were managed, and our team continued working until 11:30 p.m. to handle the increased workload.

We are deeply grateful to all the volunteers for their time and valuable support. A certificate of volunteer service in the hospital was awarded to each volunteer by the hospital administration.



## Rehabilitation Story

**On 7 August 2025, an unidentified male patient** (ID: 500501634) was brought to AIIMS Trauma Centre, Emergency Department by the police following an alleged assault. The patient, approximately 35 years old, was admitted under Medico-Legal Case (MLC) procedures. Sadly, due to his physical state, he could neither identify himself nor his residence/family. With no known family contacts and classified as BPL he was recognized as vulnerable by our social workers.

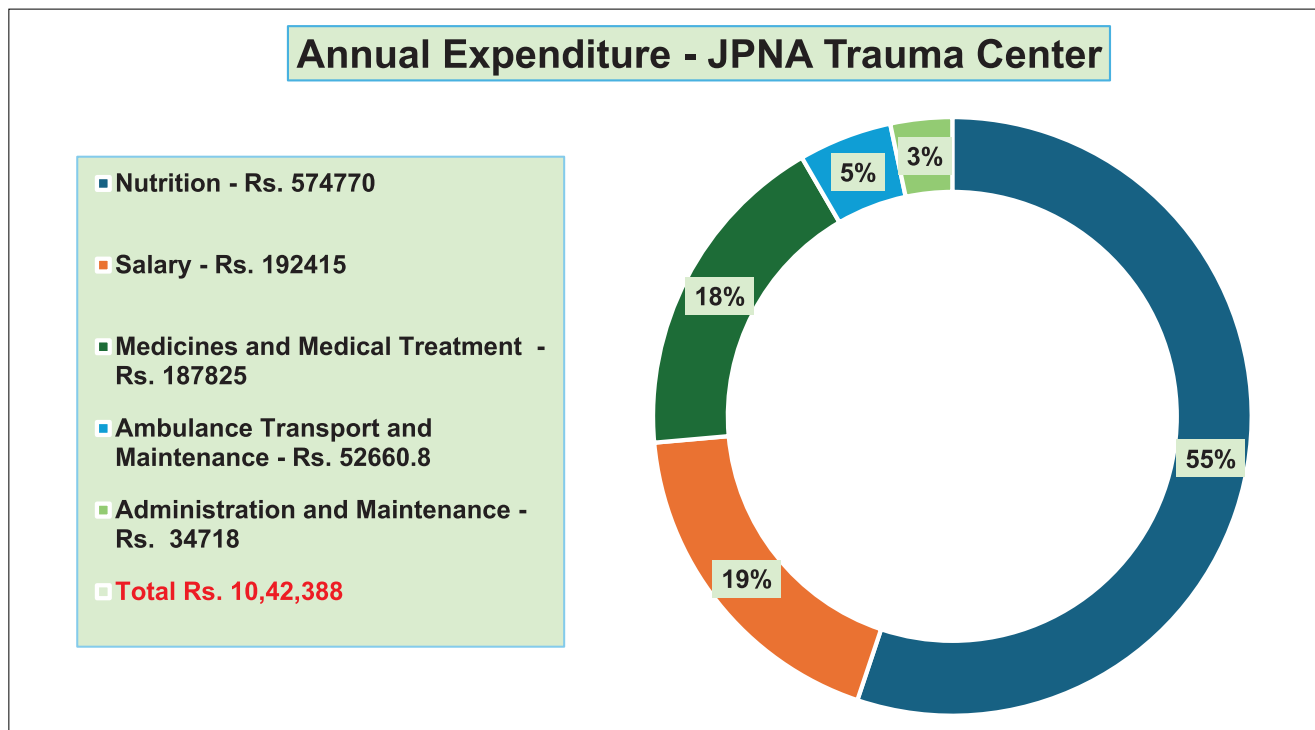
In coordination with the Medical Social Welfare Official, Sapna social workers took prompt action by transferring him to Anandam - A Home for Homeless, Noida center on 7th November 2025. We take utmost care in ensuring the medical health of our patients. This patient was transferred to Anandam, Noida center in Sapna ambulance. In the duration of his stay at the JPNA Trauma Center, Sapna social workers team at the counter actively ensured his nutritional and medicinal needs.

**On 25 August 2025, a 40-year-old male patient** (ID: 500509329) was brought to the AIIMS Trauma Centre, Emergency Department (ED) by the Delhi Police following a Road Traffic Accident (RTA). He was immediately registered and admitted the same day, occupying TC4 / Bed 1 (Orthopaedics) for specialized trauma care. Unfortunately, the immediate attention of doctors could not help him as he failed to identify himself or his residence.

As his family has been unknown as well, plus belonging to BPL (Below Poverty Line) category, NGO Sapna social workers stationed there recognized his helplessness and dependency. He was sent to Anandam – A home for homeless, Noida center on 3rd September 2025. Our homeless program remains lifeline for many unidentified patient who have no one to rely on, even for essentials such as food, medicines and clothing for treatment and care.

## Financial Overview

The grand total expenditure of our social service program at JPNA Trauma Center has been Rs. 10,42,388.80.



## 2. Safdarjung Hospital



**Summary:** SAPNA evolved from a chance visit to the Safdarjung Hospital Dharamshala. It turned our attention to the destitution faced by vulnerable, uninsured poor patients faced with exorbitant medical and other expenses far beyond their means. It also turned our attention to the negative public health environment that increases health burden and made us dream of an equity oriented, people centric model of health care capable of taking care of the morbidity and mortality of people who cannot afford even elementary health care, nutritional support and medical attention.

### Services Provided at Safdarjung Hospital

Sapna's team of trained social workers extends comprehensive support to poor and sick patients at Safdarjung Hospital & its Dharamshala. Our services include food and nutrition, medicines, diagnostic tests, surgical and post-surgical support, funeral services, transportation assistance, rehabilitation, and a wide range of related support services. Every year, we strive to expand the scope and reach of our assistance to meet the growing needs of patients.

### Medical Expenses for Treatment at Safdarjung Hospital

While treatment at Safdarjung Hospital is provided free of cost, patients often incur certain essential expenses, including:

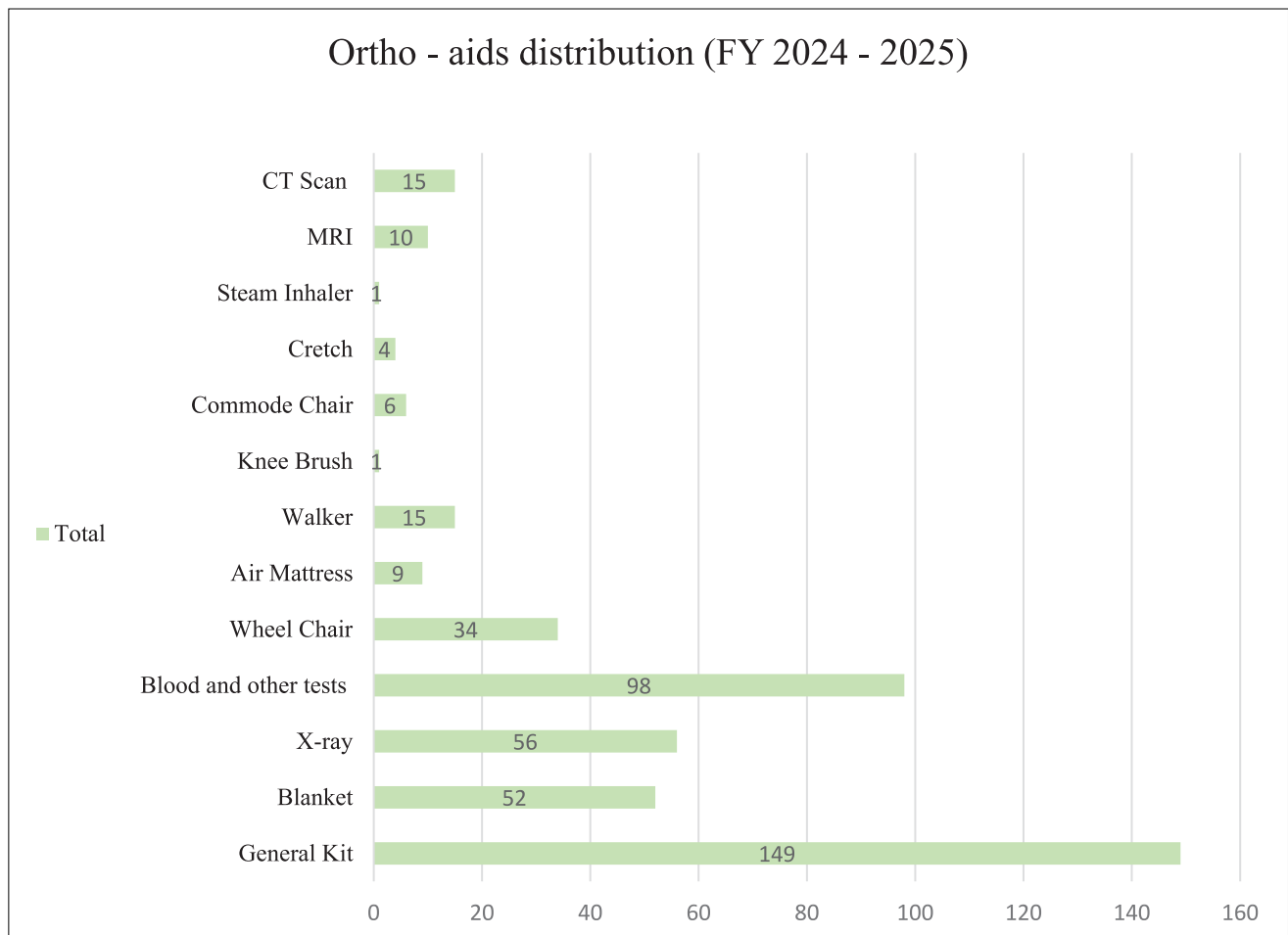
- Medicines not available at the hospital
- Implants or replacements required for surgeries
- Urgent diagnostic tests
- Orthopedic aids such as water beds, wheelchairs, special commode chairs, crutches, etc.
- Food and daily provisions for outstation patients undergoing prolonged treatment
- Other unexpected expenses related to living away from home

### Impact of Sapna’s Support in FY 2024–25

Through our continuous interventions, we were able to significantly alleviate the burden on needy patients and their families:

- 1,018 patients were assisted with OPD protocols
- 34 patients rehabilitated to Anandam – A Home for the Homeless
- 6 patients rehabilitated to other homes in Delhi
- 58 burn patients and 75 cancer patients received dedicated support
- 8,020 liters of milk distributed to patients
- 17,662 nutritious lunches and 16,300 dinner packets provided
- Surgical implants worth Rs. 21 lakhs provided to needy patients
- Orthopedic aids include wheelchairs, suction machines, walkers, air mattresses, commode chairs, and sticks worth Rs. 5 lakhs distributed
- Diagnostic tests such as MRI, CT scans, blood tests, and X-rays worth Rs. 2.5 lakhs supported

Sapna remains committed to helping and supporting needy and sick patients to the best of our capacity, ensuring dignity, care, and timely assistance for those who need it the most.



## Impact Study

Daljeet Singh, a 65-year-old man, was found living alone on the footpaths of R.K. Puram, New Delhi. He had no recollection of his family and survived by begging. On the night of December 26, 2024, at around 2:30 AM, he slipped while walking and sustained a serious injury to his hip. He was brought into the emergency room of Safdarjung hospital by PCR police officer from R.K. Puram. Groaning in pain, he was told of urgent surgery involving implantation of hip plate, that was not available in the hospital. Recognizing his vulnerable state, Dr. B.P. Sharma, HOD, Orthopedics, Safdarjung Hospital contacted our social worker, Sunil, for assistance. Recognizing his destitute situation, NGO Sapna arranged for the required implant, costing ₹25,000. Daljeet received a successful implantation on January 11th, 2025. However, the criticality was of his post-surgery state. Homeless, Daljeet was provided a safe, caring environment at Anandam – A home for homeless center – Noida by NGO Sapna. We are deeply grateful to the Magnon Group, whose generous funding made Daljeet Singh's surgery and rehabilitation possible.



Shrishti, a young girl from West Vinod Nagar, Delhi, lives with her parents and two sisters in a rented home. She studies in class 10th. The family originally hails from Mau, Uttar Pradesh. A cheerful child, who started experiencing painful bone bending in both her legs due to calcium deficiency. While her mother, Preeti, is the only bread winner in the family, serving as a data entry employee at a company in Delhi; she took Shrishti to several doctors with no avail. Later, they consulted the orthopedic department at Safdarjung Hospital. After thorough evaluation, doctors diagnosed her with a calcium deficiency, deforming her bones.

With no financial backing and without the financial support of both of her parents – her father is unwell and unable to work the treatment appeared beyond reach. However, upon the recommendation of the Unit Head In-Charge at the hospital, NGO Sapna's team visited the family, verified their situation, and coordinated closely with the doctors. A special orthopedic fixator Dr. Vinod was required for the procedure, costing ₹57,750, which had to be procured from an external orthopedic supplier, Advance Ortho. Thanks to the support fixator was arranged, and the surgery was carried out successfully. Shrishti is now on the path to recovery.

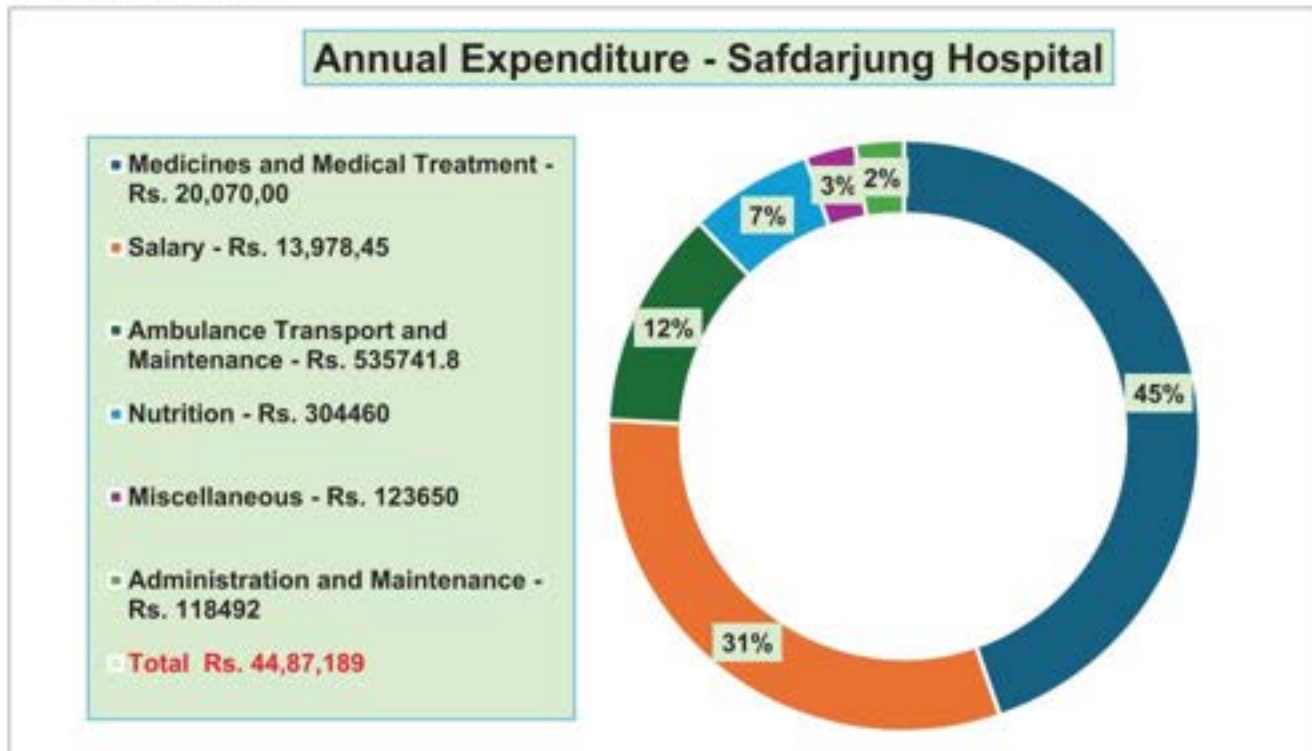




Mahaveer Singh, a 65-year-old driver from Aligarh, had spent his life working hard to support his family. In 2022, he met with a serious road accident that left one of his leg bones fractured. Despite limited means, he managed to fund his own surgery, which involved the placement of a rod in his leg. After months of recovery, he returned to work and resumed his duties with determination. However, on January 28, 2025, while cleaning his vehicle, Mahaveer slipped and fell. The impact dislodged the previously implanted rod and caused a complete collapse of his hip foundation. After initial treatment at a nearby hospital, he was referred to Safdarjung Hospital in Delhi. There, orthopedic specialist Dr. R.K. Beniwal examined him and confirmed that total hip reconstruction surgery was urgently required. The cost of the implant alone was estimated at ₹1,51,000. Mahaveer, who lived in a rented house and was the sole earner for his family of four, struggled to raise even ₹25,000. Seeing his financial hardship and urgent medical need, the hospital referred him to NGO Sapna for support.

After verifying his condition and circumstances, NGO Sapna stepped in to cover the cost of the implant and support his surgery. Thanks to this timely intervention, Mahaveer underwent successful surgery on February 18, 2025. His recovery has been remarkable. Today, Mahaveer can walk again without assistance. His sons have stepped in to support the household, and Mahaveer is gradually regaining his strength and independence.

## Financial Overview



The grand total of Safdarjung Hospital expenses in FY 2024 – 2025 has been Rs. 44,871,89. Our work centers around supporting patients at JPNA Trauma Center AIIMS and Safdarjung hospital. We have helped people to receive medical treatment by financially supporting them. Hence, our expenses for Medicines and Medical treatment have been the highest for 2024 – 2025 amounting to Rs. 20,070,00 (45%) of the total expenditure. This category has mainly covered the following sub expenses in FY 2024 – 2025: i) Surgery (Rs. 818778); ii) Medicines (Rs. 504800); iii) Patient Treatment (Rs. 683422) It is followed by the salary distribution of the social workers. You can find the breakup of major expense heads in the pie chart below.

### All India Institute of Medical Sciences

AIIMS is an Apex multi-specialty hospital located in Delhi. The hospital is equipped with 25 departments and super-specialty centers. It receives patients from all around the country – Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Haryana, Rajasthan, West Bengal, Kerala and from other nationalities as well including Nepal. NGO Sapna provides support to the less resourceful visiting AIIMS for treatment. The aid orbit consists of food and medicines. Acutely sick patients in need of hemodialysis and peritoneal Dialysis are also supported on case-to-case basis.

### 3. Renal Care

SAPNA has progressively expanded its support to renal patients after transplant. What began with assistance to 3–4 patients every month has now grown to over 10–15 patients. In FY 2024–25, an average of 12 kidney transplant patients were supported every month with medicines, and 14 patients were aided with dialysis.

We would especially like to acknowledge the generous support of **Trikal Foods & Agro Private Limited and Magnon Ltd.** in enabling us to run our renal care project.

SAPNA has progressively expanded support to renal patients after their transplant. What began with the support of 3-4 patients every month has grown to over 10-15 patients. In renal care, our social workers take hospital rounds routinely to identify post – surgery patients who would require medicinal needs to continue their post kidney surgery recovery. In FY 2024 – 25, we successfully bridged the accessibility gap in availing medicines and medical equipment/procedure such as dialysis. We distributed 34 kidney treatment related medicines and helped to procure 83 dialysis procedure for destitute patients. We would specially like to acknowledge the amazing support received from Trikaal Foods & Agro Private Limited & Magnon Ltd in running our renal care project.



### Impact Study - Kidney Patients

Lallunt Thakur, a 46-year-old man from Baijalpur village in Sonpur, Chhapra District, Bihar, has been fighting a long and difficult battle with kidney disease. The news of kidney failure in 2008 shook his physical stability. Despite the mental and monetary burden of treatment he endured for 2 years when he was later referred to the Nephrology Department at AIIMS, New Delhi. In 2010, he received a lifesaving kidney transplant. This treatment, however, came with heavy financial and caretaking responsibility over his family. Soon, he struggled to continue his work, staying with his elderly parents, his wife and three young children.

His wife assumed the role of sole bread winner in the family, barely meeting ends along with supporting his medical expenses. Hopefully, NGO Sapna has been instrumental in relieving their financial burden with supporting Lallunt's medical expenses since 2018. We sincerely wish him a long, healthy life and are proud to continue standing with him on this journey.



Pappu Kumar is 26 years old. He lives in Chagipur village in Nalanda district, Bihar. His father, Mr. Hari Nandan Prasad, is a daily wage laborer. He had to leave his studies in 2016 due to his kidney failure. 18 months in pain and suffering by going through dialysis, he received a bittersweet gift from his mother – his kidney donor. The act of utmost compassion saved his life, but the road ahead for him and his family were full of cuts. The whole surgery cost them heavily including financially and mentally. Pappu was restricted due to his poor health, obstructing him from continuing to work. Moreover, he had to take care of his mother, who became weak post-surgery. His medicines alone cost around ₹7,000 to ₹8,000 every month. This had become very hard for the family to afford. Later, he came to know of NGO Sapna. He visited our social service counter at the Trauma Centre, AIIMS. After seeing his condition, we decided to support him with medicines. Since 2018, we have been helping Pappu with regular medicine support. We are doing whatever we can to help him.



Rajkumar is 41 years old and lives in Chak Faridabad village, Vaishali district, Bihar. His father's name is Rajendra Singh. In 2015, Rajkumar found out that both his kidneys had failed. He first got treatment in Muzaffarpur, Bihar. Later, doctors sent him to AIIMS Hospital in Delhi for better care. For almost 20 months, he had to go through dialysis. It was a very difficult time for him and his family. The treatment was costly and tiring.

In 2017, Rajkumar got a kidney transplant. His father gave him one of his kidneys. It was a brave and loving decision that saved Rajkumar's life. Rajkumar now lives with his parents, his wife, and a small son. Even after the transplant, his health is still weak. He cannot do heavy or hard work.

The family lives in a simple mud house in their village. Rajkumar works as a guard in someone's house. This is the only source of income for the family. They are still facing financial difficulties. Even with all these problems, Rajkumar stays strong. His father's love gave him a second chance at life. His story is about love, courage, and never giving up.

# Eye care

**Summary:** For the past 18 years, Sapna has been committed to delivering inclusive eye care services, with a strong focus on reaching rural areas and villages of Alwar district, Rajasthan. Our work emphasizes the prevention of blindness through general eye care, particularly cataract detection and surgeries. To serve the most vulnerable, we regularly organize outreach eye camps in remote villages, providing free check-ups along with transportation and surgical support for patients. Since inception, we have conducted over 500 outreach camps and successfully performed more than 15,000 cataract surgeries of poor and elderly patients. In 2017, Sapna established Mahatma Gandhi Netralaya at village Kaduki, Alwar, which has since become a cornerstone of our eye care initiatives. These sustained efforts not only restore vision but also transform lives by empowering individuals to live with dignity and independence.

## I. Mahatma Gandhi Netralaya (MGN)

**Beginning:** Began to provide quality eyecare services to impoverished rural population of Alwar in 2007. This effort culminated into establishment of Mahatma Gandhi Eyecare Hospital, in Kaduki. It began operations in 2017. The construction of hospital is the reflection of strong commitment by the generous support of late Ms. Prabha Singh and the CSR initiative of Coal India Ltd.



### Our Services

1. Core service: We provide free of cost secondary level eye care services. It is conducted via organizing outreach eye camps in villages of Alwar district, Rajasthan. Other service: Walk in OPD service constitutes providing eye care service to the rural population with minimal charge of INR 100. It is available from Monday to Saturday, from 9 AM to 5 PM, aimed at making eyecare facilities accessible to the rural areas.
2. Outreach camps are held twice a week in rural areas of Alwar district & neighbouring districts. These camps offer free eye check-ups to those in need. For individuals identified with cataract during these camps, we provide free transportation to and for from the facility, where cataract surgeries are performed without any charges from the patients. The next day after recovery, they are safely transported back to

the camp location. In this way we can reach out to many poor patients who cannot come to Netralaya for checkups and cataract screening. Senior citizens are most vulnerable and have difficulty in moving out. The Camps suit their needs the most.

## Team Netralaya

1. Mahatma Gandhi Netralaya functions on all days except Sundays. Residents of nearby villages come for checkups, treatment of minor problems and screening for cataract operation.
2. The hospital has three full time Optometrist, two part-time eye surgeons, one part time OT technician, one part time Anaesthetist and other supporting staff.
3. Cataract surgeries are performed twice a week as per patient footfalls.

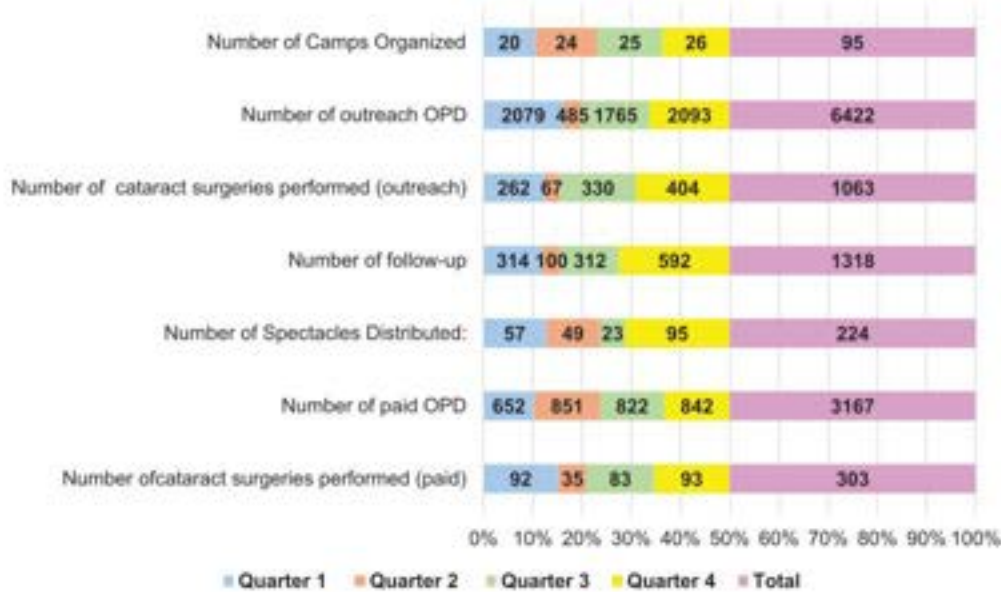
## Equipment's at MGN

1. The Netralaya is fully equipped with latest eye equipment's such as Phaco Machine (Johnson & Johnson vision) Microscope (Zeiss), Optical Biometry, Yag Laser (Appasamy associates), Slit Lamp (Zeiss), Auto Clave (Hansein Class B), ARK (Topcom), Retinoscope (Heine), 90D Lense, etc.



Likewise, in FY 2024 – 2025, we have worked for providing eye care for the vulnerable groups, especially women in the nearby rural areas. This includes conducting field visits to identify cataract patients. MGN recognizes the untended neglect often faced by the elderly. Our eye care services include identification of such patients, convincing them to have medically checked to managing their transport for appointments/surgeries/operation. Following is the analysis of our services in detail for FY 2024 – 2025.

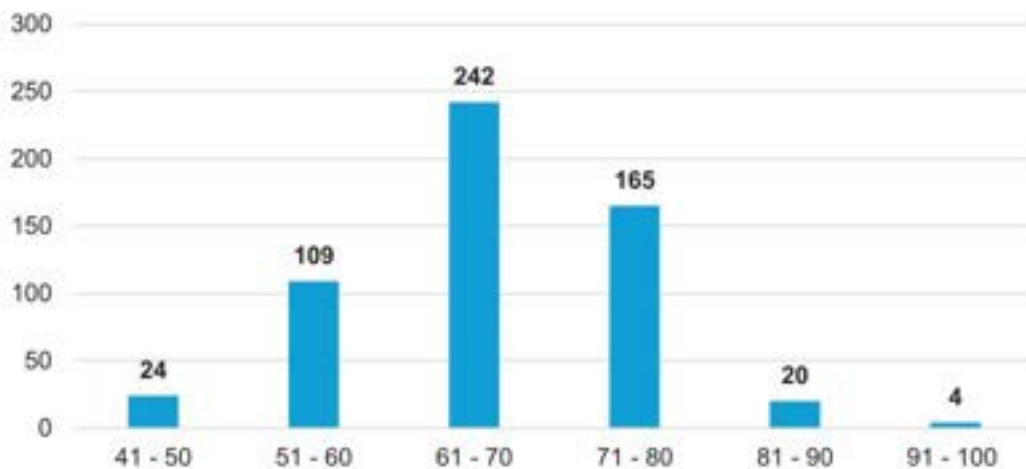
### MGN: Patient Statistics FY 2024- 2025



**Outcome:** The focus of MGN is to deliver quality eye care to the rural vulnerable population of the Alwar district. It involves a holistic care from identifying cataract patients in free village camps organized regularly to provide quality healthcare including post – surgery follow ups. The FY 2024 – 2025 reflects our success in fulfilling this goal. The annual data analysis highlighted the number of outreach cataract surgeries were double the number of paid cataract surgeries. Our post – surgery follow up visits by the patients have also yielded positive numbers. FY 2024 – 2025 witnessed 86.3% follow ups per cataract surgery (paid + free).

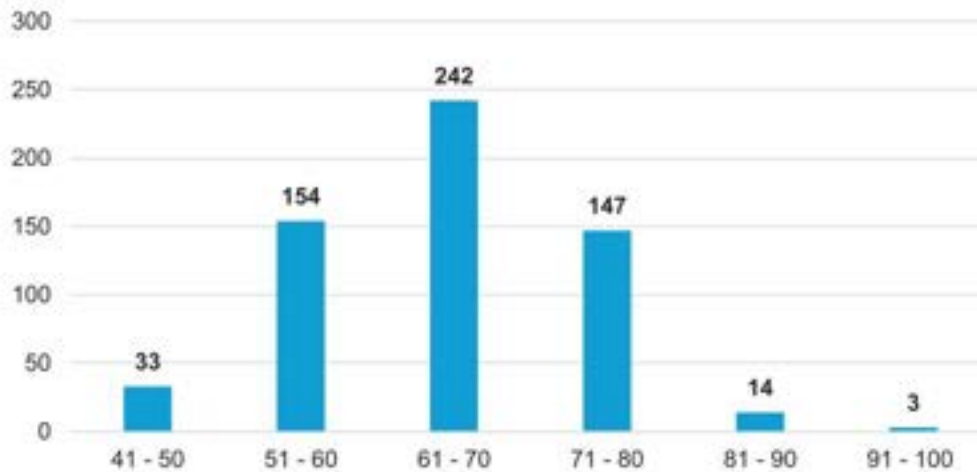

**1.1 Impact:** Mahatma Gandhi Netralaya targets economically vulnerable population in the rural parts of Alwar district, Rajasthan. Women are most vulnerable group in terms of maintaining eye care. Yet they are the most exposed to pollution sources causing eye problems such as cataract. Our efforts in FY 2024 – 2025 have resulted in fruitful futures especially for these women. Our outreach camp, that is focused on identifying patients in the field and bringing them in for treatment has been instrumental in treatment women, along with BPL patients who were not charged fee for the medical treatment. In this context, more women have received our treatment 51.2% (593) compared to male patients 48.8% (564).

### Our niche – Mahatma Gandhi Netralaya

We are the only eye hospital in the district that keeps patients under care for 1 day after surgery and discharges them on the 2nd day, ensuring they receive proper guidance and medication before returning home. We also use hydrophobic foldable lenses. We strongly believe that everyone deserves the best possible vision, regardless of their economic condition. Therefore, we provide the highest quality lenses within our capacity and are continuously working to further improve the quality of lenses we use.

### Prospects

- Conduct 110 outreach eye camps in the surrounding areas to screen and treat patients.
- Perform 2,000 eye surgeries, including cataract operations, ensuring quality care for all patients.
- Expand services to include glaucoma and retina care, providing comprehensive eye treatment under one roof.
- Develop a sustainable, patient-friendly model where no patient is denied eye care due to financial constraints, ensuring accessibility and affordability for all.

## Impact Study

Background - Ramphal Yadav, a 72-year-old farmer from Peela Dhawa village in Alwar, Rajasthan, had been living a hardworking and active life. His eyesight began to blur, getting so bad that he could only see fingers held close to his face. Simple daily work like farming, taking care of his goats and cattle, became very difficult. He started feeling helpless and lost his confidence.

Ramphal attended a free eye check-up camp organized by NGO Sapna. The doctors from Mahatma Gandhi Netralaya checked his eyes and told him he needed cataract surgery. Along with his consent, the surgery was conducted. Marking success, his eyesight improved to 6/12, improving his life quality significantly. He goes to the market on his own, works in the fields, and happily talks with people in his village. Most importantly, he has regained his confidence. In his words:

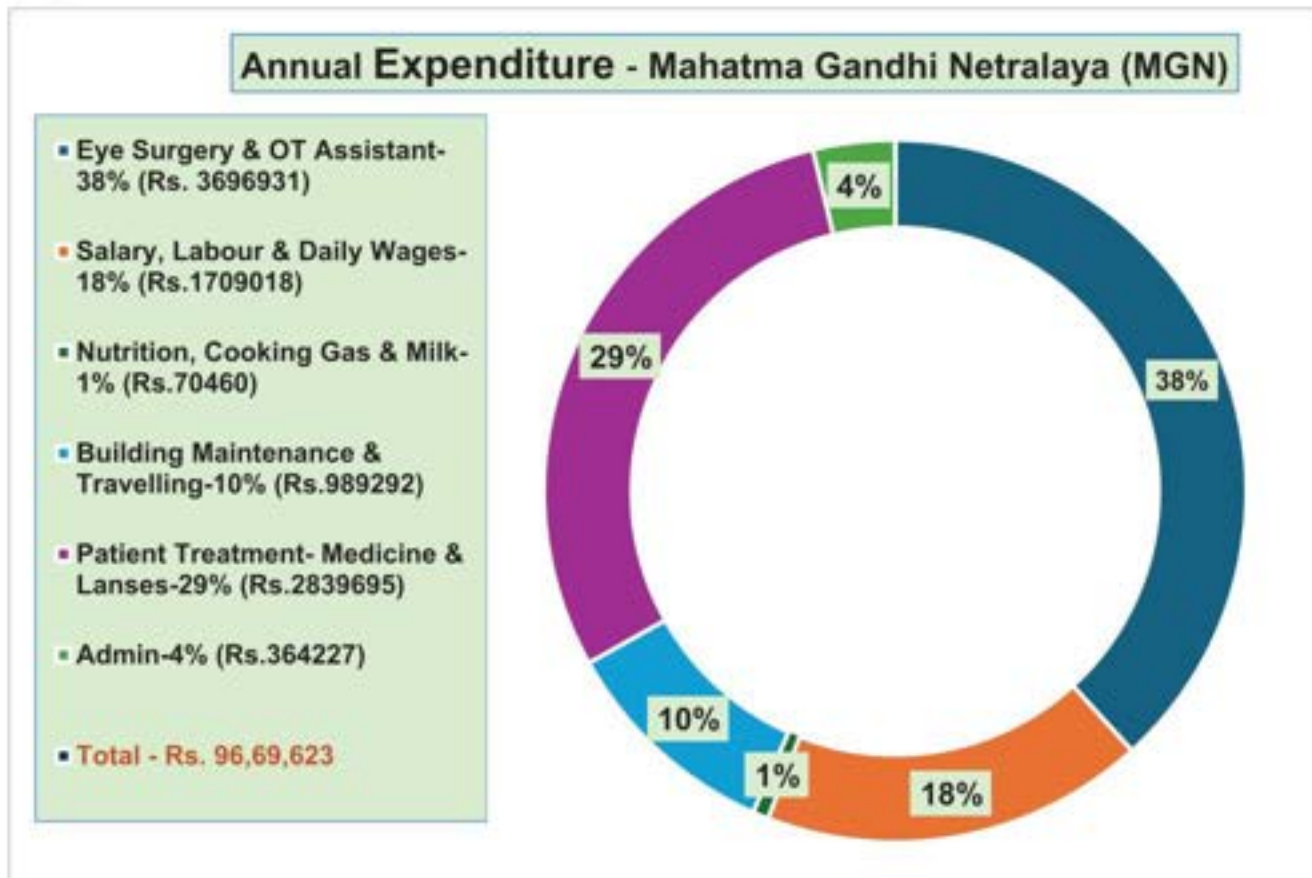

Background - Baksar, a 70-year-old homemaker, lives with her family, including two sons and grandchildren. Her eyesight began to deteriorate to the point where she could only count fingers from one meter away. Her daily life chores such as cooking, recognizing family members, stitching clothes, and walking became a challenge. She started losing confidence and independence to others - even to go to the mosque. She went to a free eye check-up camp organized by Mahatma Gandhi Netralaya. The doctors checked her eyes and advised her to have cataract surgery. The operation was a success. With the help of NGO Sapna, her husband Rahman fully supported her, and with his help, she agreed to the surgery. The operation was a success. The very next day, Baksar could see clearly again. It felt like she had gotten her world back. Now, Baksar is independent again. She cooks for her family, manages the house, and goes to the mosque on her own. Her confidence and happiness have returned. She now tells other women not to be afraid of cataracts, because with treatment, life can become better again.



## Financial Overview

The grand total expenditure for the Mahatma Gandhi Netralaya for the FY 2024 – 2025 has been Rs.96,69,623. MGN is focused on providing quality medical services for eyecare to the underprivileged people from rural Alwar.

# Anandam: Shelter to Homeless

**Summary:** *'Anandam', with humble beginnings in 2007, has been catering to the palliative needs of patients and providing both temporary and permanent homes for destitute individuals facing challenges of homelessness, domestic abuse, and specialized medical conditions. NGO Sapna currently operates four centers—three in Alwar district (Vijay Mandir, Dadikar, and Kaduki) and one in Noida, Uttar Pradesh.*

**Anandam – A Home for the Homeless (men) and Anandamayee – A Home for the Homeless (women)** are noble initiatives aimed at tackling the problem of homelessness in the country. We work closely with local stakeholders, hospitals, and the police to provide shelter and care to those in need.

Over the past **18 years** of serving the homeless, we have gained deep insights into the challenges they face. Many of them suffer from mental or physical illnesses, are victims of accidents or abuse, and many a times lose their memory. Our Anandam – Home for the Homeless program supports them at the lowest points in their lives, ensuring dignity, safety, and hope.

## Specialized Care for Coma Patients

At Anandam, we extend our services to include the care of coma patients, providing them with specialized medical attention, monitoring, and compassionate support. This is a rare responsibility, and we are committed to offering this critical service with utmost dedication.

The following are the details of the number of homeless patients we served during **FY 2024–25**:

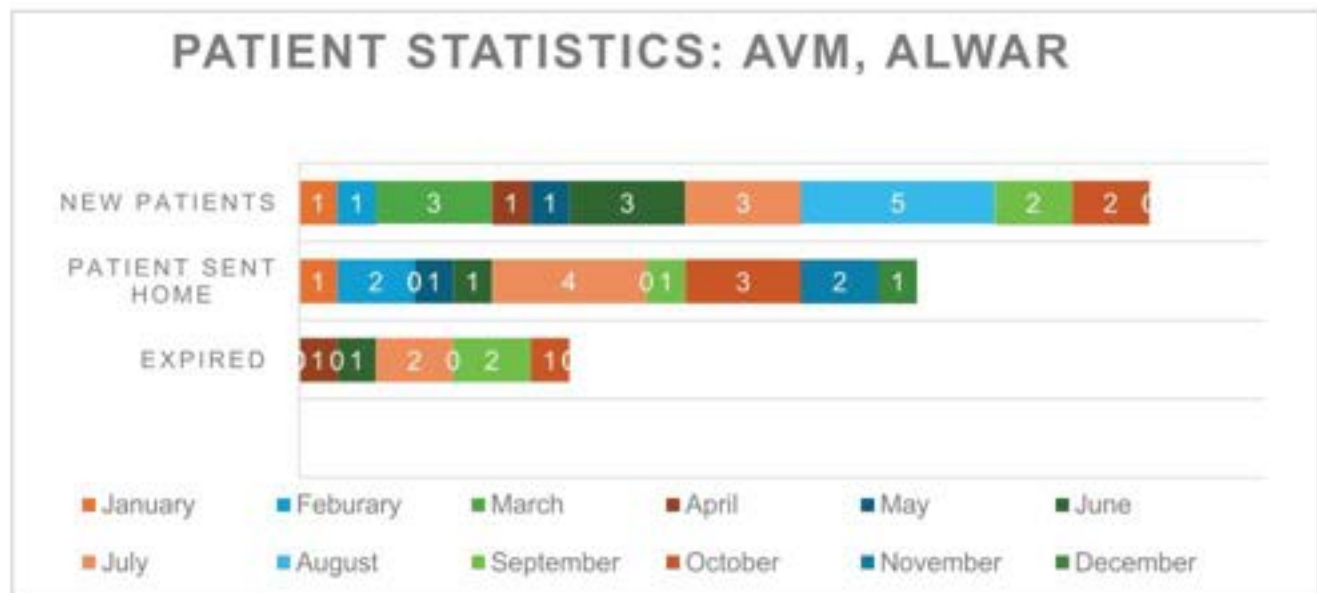
The total number of new patients recorded across all centers in **FY 2024 – 2025 is 155**. Similarly, total number of patients sent home and expired in the same period counts to **64** and **21** respectively.

## I. Anandamayee Vijay Mandir, Alwar (AVM)



SAPNA established its first home for the homeless at Vijay Mandir, Alwar in January 2007. The home acts as a safe shelter for destitute survivors of trauma and other grave illnesses who need recuperative care and support. It is a role model for palliative care, acknowledged by premier hospitals like AIIMS and Safdarjung Hospital, as most of the patients are from these hospitals.

In 2019, in view of increasing numbers of homeless women, a separate home, named Anandmayee was carved out for homeless women at Vijay Mandir. The home provides a haven to women who are victims of violence, trafficking and sexual abuse, and other forms of severe trauma.

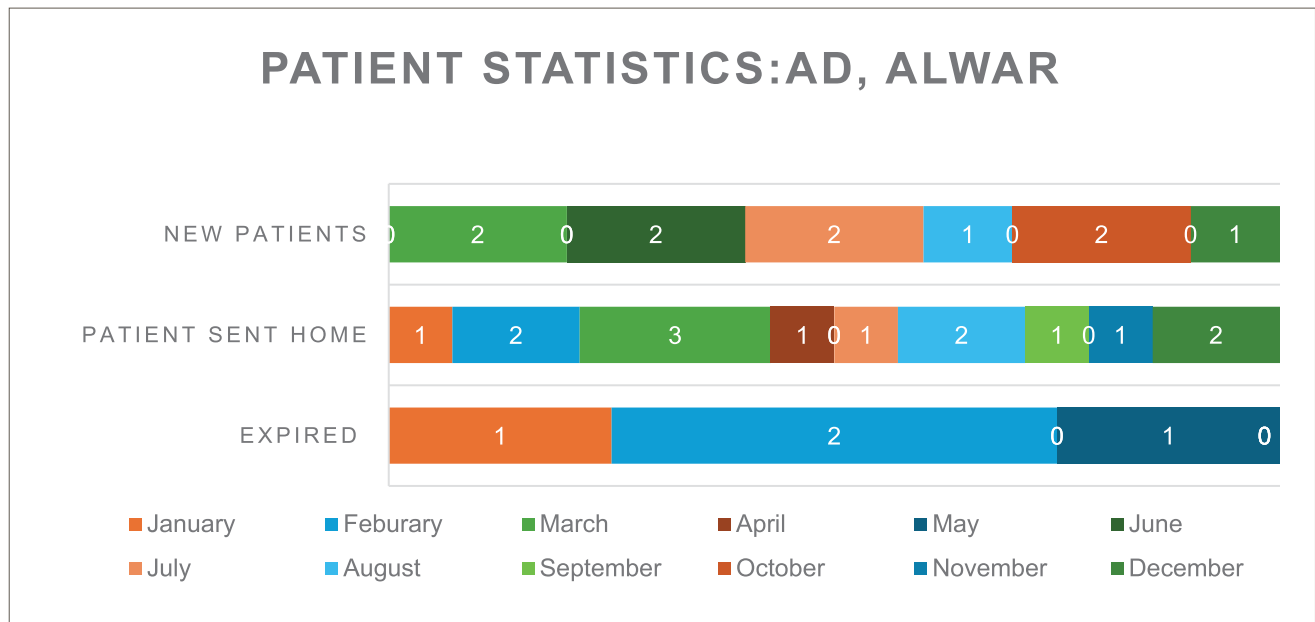


## 2. Anandam, Dadhikar, Alwar (AD)



NGO Sapna has constructed a scenic 60-bedded facility in village Dadhikar, Alwar, with the CSR support of Hindustan Zinc Ltd. The Government of Rajasthan has designated this center as the official 'Old Age Home' for Alwar district.

This center is dedicated entirely to male patients, particularly those who require monthly medical supervision and can be managed effectively with regular daily medication.



*Description: Patient statistics of the Anandam Dadhikar, Alwar*



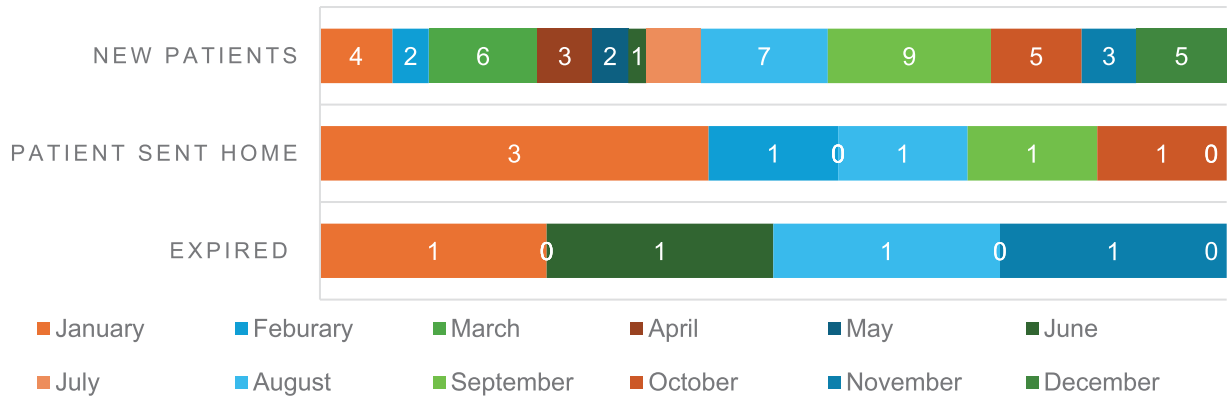
### 3. Anandam Kaduki, Alwar (AK)

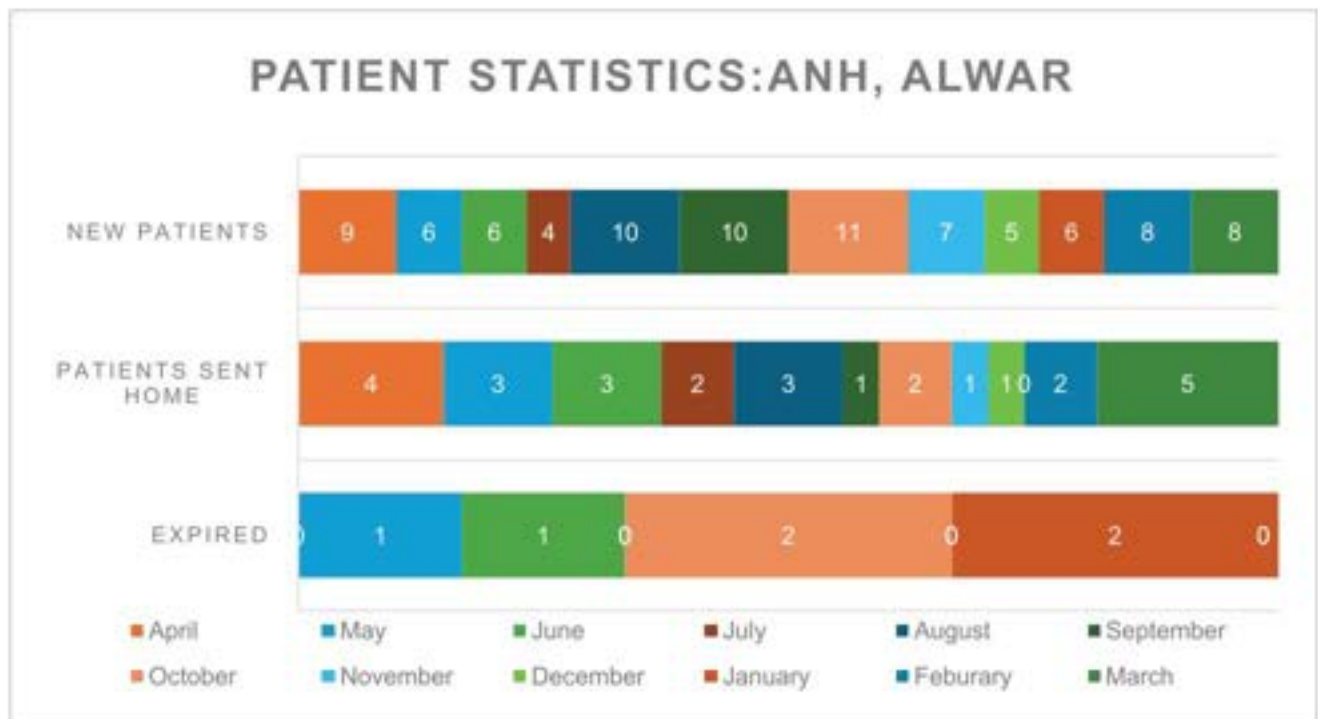

#### 4. Anandam, Noida (AN)



Our Noida hospice was established in **2017** with the exemplary support of Shri Nishtha Arora, who generously dedicated his entire house for patient care. The hospice caters to the needs of the poor, the sick, the homeless, and others requiring recuperative care and support.

It functions as a short-stay home and serves as a transit facility for patients traveling to and from Alwar for follow-ups and emergencies.

Anandam Noida welcomed 90 new patients in **FY 2024–25**, while a significant number of patients—27 in total—were located and reunited with their families. The center also recorded the passing of 6 patients during the year.

The majority of patients at Anandam Noida are transferred from AIIMS Trauma Center and Safdarjung Hospital, New Delhi. These individuals have suffered from various forms of physical or mental trauma. Most are referred because they have no family support and are therefore admitted in the “unknown ward” of the Trauma Center. Others require lifelong palliative care, with very limited chances of recovery.

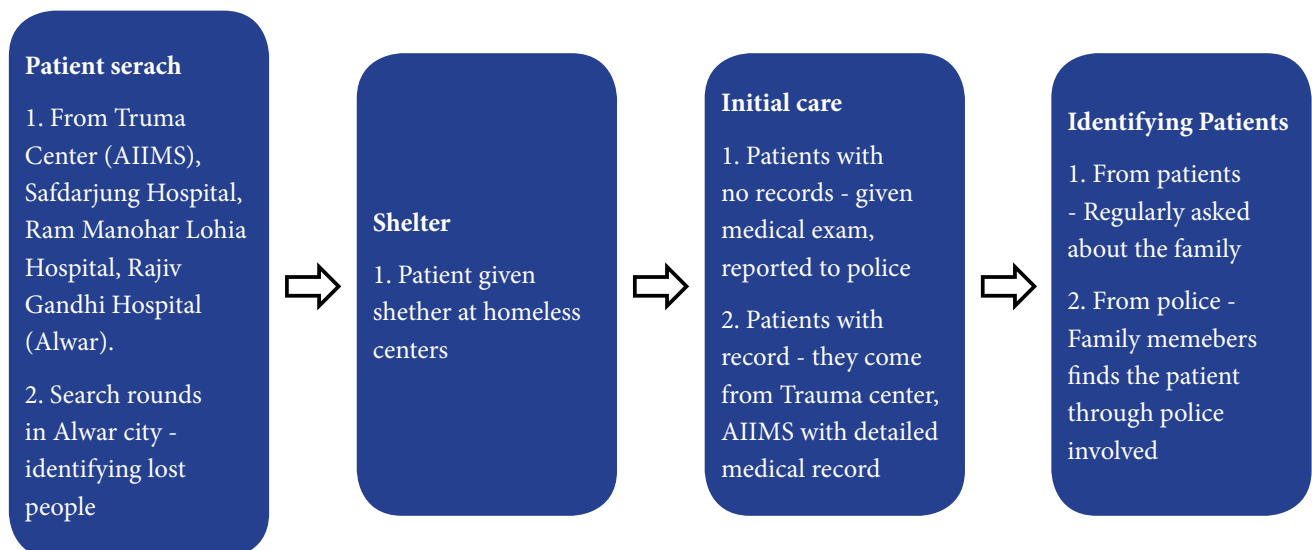
In such cases, while the trauma centers provide initial medical stabilization, the patients require long-term care and support. Our dedicated team of social workers ensures they are provided with shelter, food, medical attention, and compassionate care for as long as they remain with us. For patients who require permanent residence, we arrange for their transfer to our long-term shelter facilities at Anandam in Alwar.

### Our niche in shelter for homeless center



- A) The time between 'Initial Care' and 'Identifying Patients', is when the search of the patient's family/house is taken. There are factors influencing the efforts of the NGO Sapna's social workers to locate the homes of the sheltered patients. Two main important factors include: -
1. Medical condition of the patient in question. Whether they have suffered from any mental illness that has inhibited their memory. In such cases the social workers are tasked with regularly interacting with patients, to gather some relevant information.
  2. Existing in police records – We have received some cases where patients have been reunited with the family, searching for them. They usually report to their local police station. We also ensure that the details of all unknown patients admitted at Anandam are promptly shared with the respective local police stations and their photographs are uploaded on our website. At times, this plays a crucial role in reuniting patients with their families.
- B) Anandam – programme is centred around providing holistic care to the patients. Two pillars of this care involve ensuring their nutritional and physical & mental wellbeing. The patients often require specific nutritional as well as palliative care. The details are provided below:-
1. Nutritional Care – At Anandam, the patients are well cared for, with special attention to their health and recovery needs. Since the majority of them suffer from some form of mental or physical trauma, nutritious and hygienic food is a top priority across all our centers. Patients are provided with four wholesome meals each day, along with tea and snacks:
- **Breakfast** – A balanced meal that includes fruits and grains to ensure energy and nourishment at the start of the day.
  - **Lunch** – A complete and nutritious meal comprising green vegetables, fruits, pulses, and grains to support their daily dietary requirements.
  - **Evening Tea & Snacks** – Tea is served with biscuits and light snacks. This small gesture provides comfort and helps patients feel at home while they recover from trauma.
  - **Dinner** – A light and healthy meal that includes milk, vegetables, and grains as a consistent part of their diet, ensuring they end the day with adequate nutrition.

We are deeply grateful to Feeding India for providing dry ration support, which plays a vital role in ensuring that our patients receive consistent, nutritious, and high-quality meals across all Anandam centers.

Medical and palliative care – Patients with mental or physical ailments are given proper treatment. In case of patients residing at the centers in Alwar district namely, Anandamayee (Vijay Mandir), Anandam Kaduki, Anandam Dadikar, all are referred to Alwar government hospital & ESIC Medical College Alwar. There is an ambulance facility dedicated to every center.

## Prospects

- Provide shelter to 200 homeless patients by December 2025.
- Expand the temporary structure at Anandam Dadikar to accommodate 50 additional patients.
- Hire professionals such as doctors, nursing staff, and compounders to ensure better care of patients

## Impact study



### A Mother's Love: An Extraordinary Reunion After 17 Years

With tearful eyes and faded memories, Romati arrived at Anandmayee – A Home for the Homeless in May 2024, brought from Delhi's Trauma Center in a fragile mental state. With a forgotten identity, she began to recuperate. On one fateful day, she shared fragmented memories of her village with Avinash, the Deputy In-charge. This led the Sapna IT team, Jitendra and Rehan, to search online. Using Google Street View, they traced a seed shop in Ghanashore, Amoda Khamaria near Jabalpur, and obtained the phone number of a shopkeeper. This connected them to Dinesh, Romati's son – who revealed the story of her disappearance from the village some 17 years ago. Unable to recognize her photo—since he was only 10 when she disappeared—he asked for his uncle's assistance, who recognized Romati instantly as his sister. A video call was arranged, and when Romati and Shyam came face to face, tears flowed freely, marking a miraculous reunion.

Gradually, even Dinesh recognized his mother's voice, and his disbelief gave way to overwhelming emotion. On February 6, Dinesh and Shyam reached Vijay Mandir, where heartfelt reunion took place. For Dinesh, now 27, it was fulfilment of his incomplete life. This reunion was not only a deeply emotional moment for them but also a reminder to all of us that time may pass, but a mother's love never fades, and the joy of reunion surpasses the pain of separation.



### A Journey Back: The Story of Shobha Devi

On August 18, 2024, a woman was found wandering near Thekra railway crossing. She identified herself as Shobha, her mental condition had suffered although physical state showed no signs of trauma.

She spoke in Telugu, which made communication highly restricted. Despite this obstacle we confirmed her location – Hyderabad. She also mentioned her husband's name - Yadeya. However, she was not able provide any contact information, she did mentioned that her house was near a Sai Baba temple in IN Nagar, Hyderabad.

For months, her details remained too vague to trace. Finally, on December 3, 2024, we used Google Street View to locate Sai Baba temples in Hyderabad. We contacted one of the priests, who connected us to a language mediator. His role bore fruits – he was able to gather more precise details of her location. He then visited her neighbourhood and managed to contact her

family. The very next day, on December 4, 2024, Shobha's son arrived in Delhi by flight. He shared that his mother, due to her mental condition, had wandered away from home several times before and the family had been deeply worried. Seeing her again brought immense relief and joy. With gratitude, he thanked our organization for reuniting them. Shobha returned to Hyderabad with her son, and her story reminds us how compassion and modern tools together can make extraordinary reunions possible.



### **A Journey Home: The Reunion of Juba Murmu**

On September 1, 2024, an unidentified woman named Juba Murmu was brought to Delhi's Safdarjung Hospital. Speaking only Bengali, she struggled to barely communicate her identity, address or background due to language barrier. Fortunately during many patient conversations, she recalled her husband's name as Pagol, her father-in-law as Moso, and described her home as "Dulo Narayanpur Jungle, Havda, Kolkata," adding that she belonged to a tribal community.

On December 14, 2024, with no progress, we took help of our former employee, Tushar. Through his translations, we located the her words "Dulo Narayanpur", on Google maps and contacted a medical store owner in Bahir Khanda, Tarakeswar, Howrah. Recognizing juba, he confirmed her identity to a nearby village. They promised to connect her with her family. That evening, Juba spoke with her son for the first time in years, with the help of an acquaintance who bridged the language gap. Emotional and hopeful, Juba awaited their arrival. Days passed, but finally, on January 18, 2025, her son, Taposh Murmu, and nephew, Lakshmi Ram Murmu, reached Anandamayi Vijay Mandir to reunite with her. The moment was filled with joy as Juba instantly recognized them and happily agreed to return home. Her family expressed heartfelt gratitude to the organization Sapna for their relentless efforts. Her confirmed address was "P. Narayanpur, Bahir Khand, Hudali, West Bengal, PIN - 712405." Juba's story is the beacon of persistence.

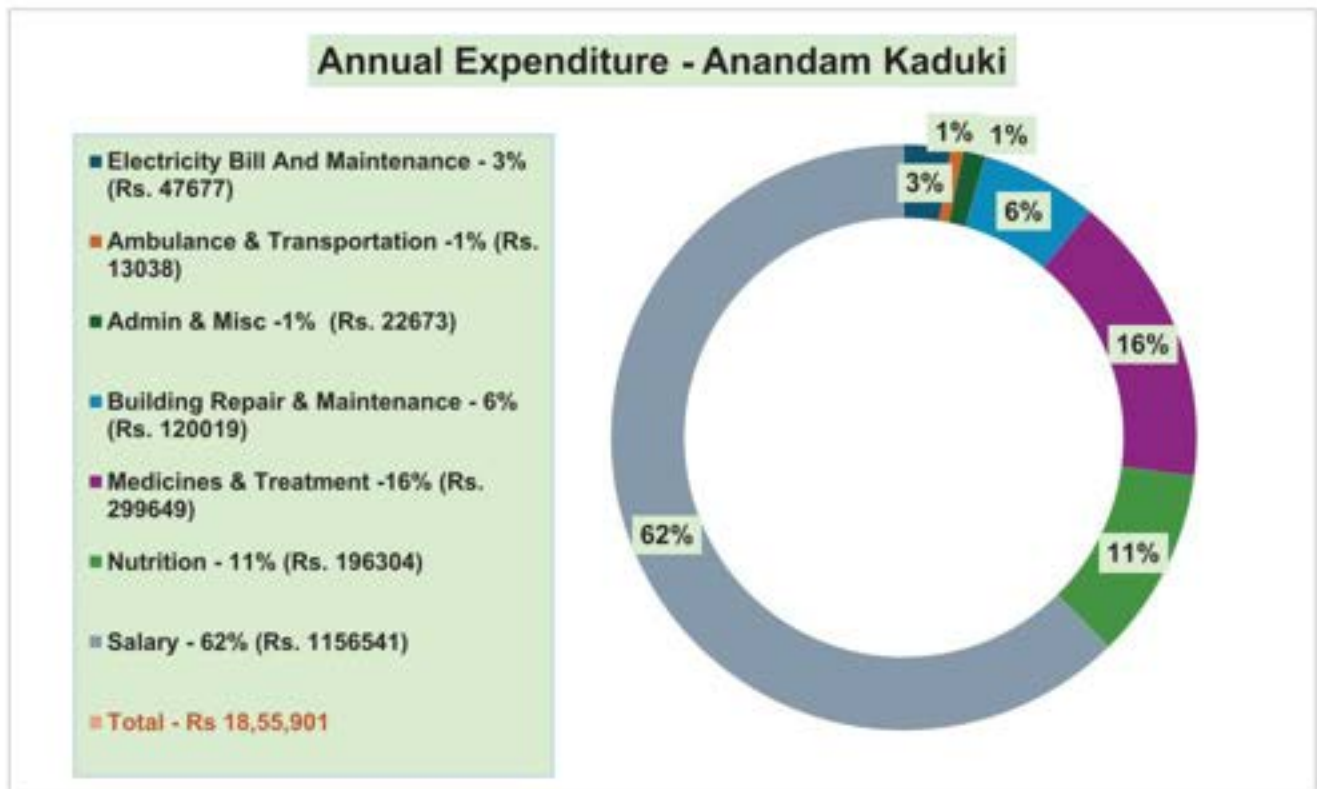
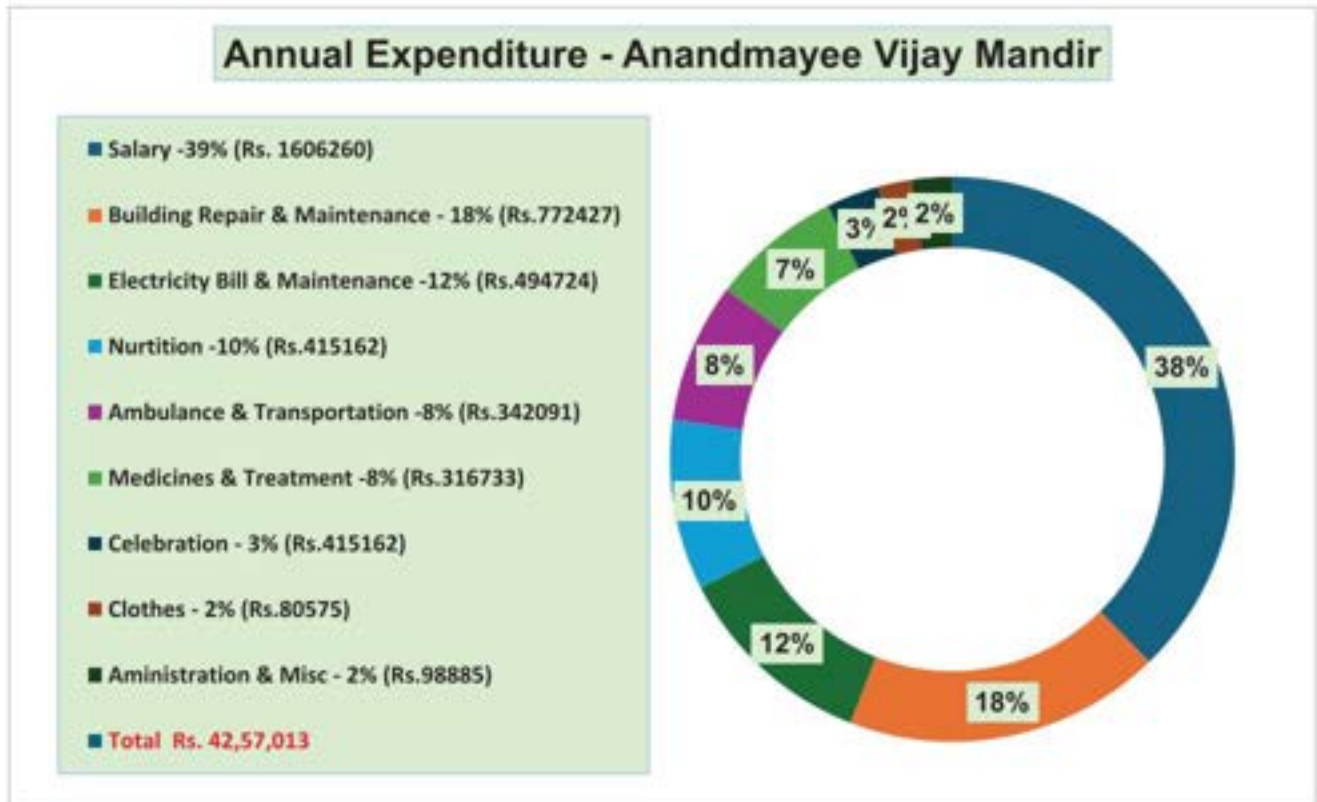


### **A journey of courage: Story of Dharampal**

Dharampal, a 28 year old youth suffered from road accident while travelling to his office for work in Gurugram. Sustaining heavy leg fracture, he was left at the mercy of time by his younger brothers to fend for himself. Determined to not give up, Dharampal sought help from his close relative in Dadikar. He was contacted by Rajesh, Anandam Kaduki in charge. Soon, his treatment was supported by NGO Sapna at ESIC Hospital. The cost of treatment was significantly reduced for him from Rs. 60,000 to Rs. 10,000. As he recuperated at the hospital, Dharampal was transferred to the care of social workers at Anandam Kaduki for long term recovery on 24th August 2025. We are glad to report that Dharampal has fully recovered from his injuries. He left Anandam Kaduki for hopeful future on 28th February 2025 and currently works at the same company in Gurugram.

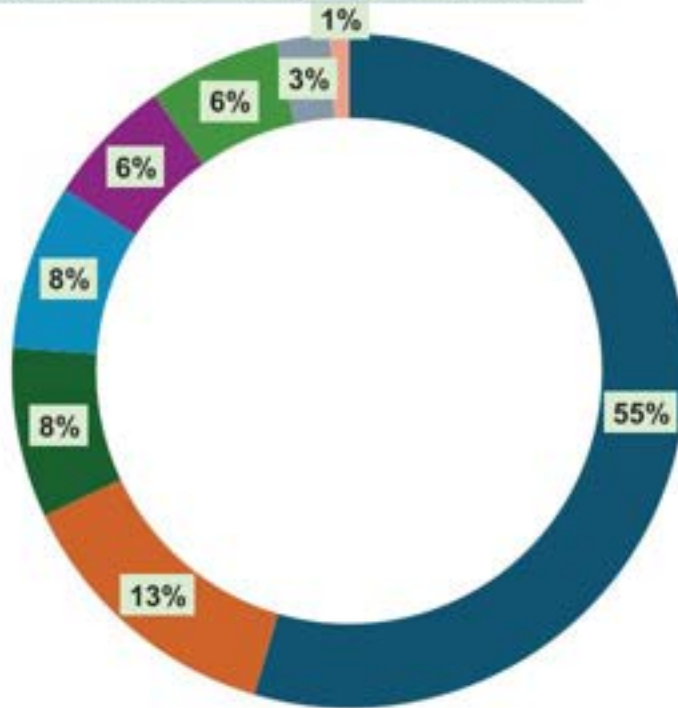

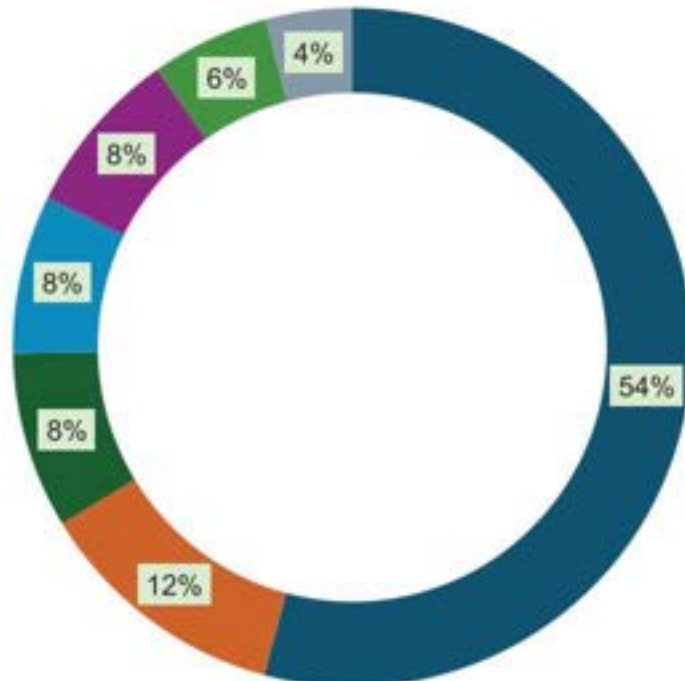

# Education

**Summary:** NGO Sapna believes that quality education is the key to transforming rural India and strengthening the nation's economy. Providing education to underprivileged girls is not only a step towards improving their lives and opportunities but also a way to bring long-lasting change to society, lifestyle, and the face of rural India. To bridge this gap, we established **Sapna Shikshalaya**, a school dedicated to empowering rural girls through quality education. Alongside this, we recognize the equal importance of digital literacy and IT skills for rural youth in today's world. To address this need, we **established Sapna IT College in Alwar**, with two additional centers in Noida and Almora, equipping young people with practical skills that enhance their employability and prospects.

## I. Sapna Shikshalaya



Education is the most powerful tool to break the cycle of poverty and transform society. With this belief, Sapna Shikshalaya was established on **8th July, 2015** to **provide quality, relevant, and flexible education** to underprivileged girls in rural Alwar. What began with just 19 girls has now blossomed into a thriving institution, currently educating 306 girls from 18 villages.

The school is more than just an academic space—it is a beacon of hope for girls from socially and economically disadvantaged families. By nurturing both their academic and personal development, Sapna Shikshalaya is helping them realize their dreams and contribute to building a better future for themselves, their families, and their communities.

## Our Operational Facilities

Sapna Shikshalaya is powered by a team of 22 dedicated teachers, led by our Principal, Pramukh Sewak and an educational motivator who ensures high-quality learning and holistic growth.



## Timings

- **Summer** : 7:30 am – 1:30 pm
- **Winter** : 8:00 am – 2:00 pm

### Expenditure on a girl child

Providing quality education is resource intensive. The annual expenditure per girl child is Rs. 26,000. To instil a sense of ownership, parents contribute a token amount:

- Rs. 600 per month for the primary section
- Rs. 800 per month for the senior section

The balance is raised through individual and institutional donors. Girls from single-parent households are fully exempt from this contribution, ensuring that financial hardship never becomes a barrier to education. This sustainable cost-sharing model allows the school to continue its mission of uplifting underprivileged rural girls.

### Achievements – 2024-25

- Class 10 Board Result (1st Batch): 1 student scored 90–100%, 1 scored 80–90% and 4 scored 70–80%. 1 student scored 50% – 60% .
- Class 8 Board Result (2nd Batch): All 12 girls scored A grade.
- Class 5 Board Result (3rd Batch): 19 girls scored A grade and 3 scored B grade.

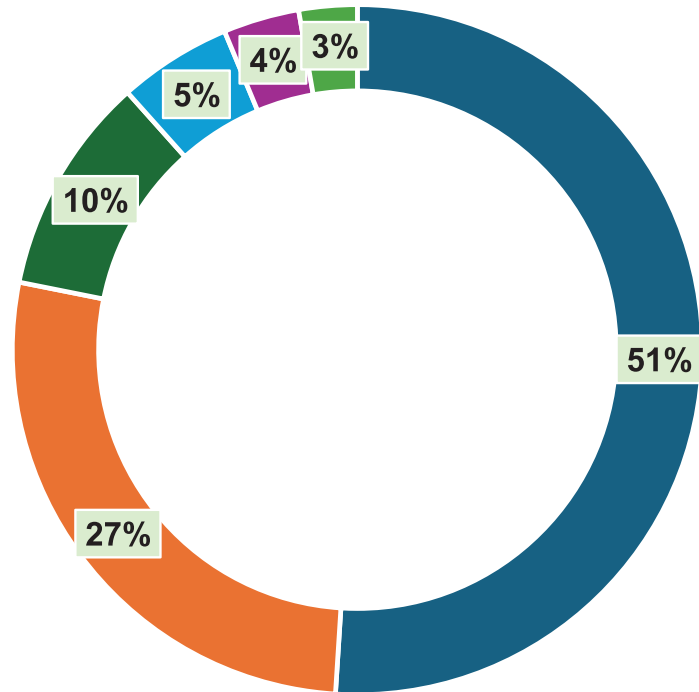
- The land has already been procured, and architectural drawings have been finalized.

## 2. Sapna IT College – Bridging the Digital Divide for Rural Youth



Since its inception in 2010, Sapna IT College has been dedicated to empowering rural youth by providing quality digital literacy and IT skills. We believe that in today's world, computer education is as essential as formal schooling for improving employability and livelihood opportunities.

Over the years, the College has expanded its offerings to meet the evolving needs of the job market. Alongside flagship courses like RS-CIT (Rajasthan State Certificate in Information Technology) and Accounts & GST, this year we introduced two new courses: Advanced Excel and Digital Marketing. We also forged a valuable partnership with the NIIT Foundation for running the Digital Marketing program and facilitating placement opportunities for our students.

## Our Operational Facilities

The Computer Literacy Center at Vijay Mandir, Alwar, is one of our flagship initiatives and is equipped with:

- A state-of-the-art computer lab with 40 workstations
- Two spacious classrooms accommodating 40 students
- Two smart TVs and audio-visual tools to enhance interactive learning
- A strict attendance policy to ensure discipline and commitment
- A team of three qualified teachers who provide personalized guidance
- Separate batches for girls wherever possible, to create a safe and comfortable learning environment
- These facilities ensure that students not only acquire technical knowledge but also develop confidence, discipline, and employability skills.

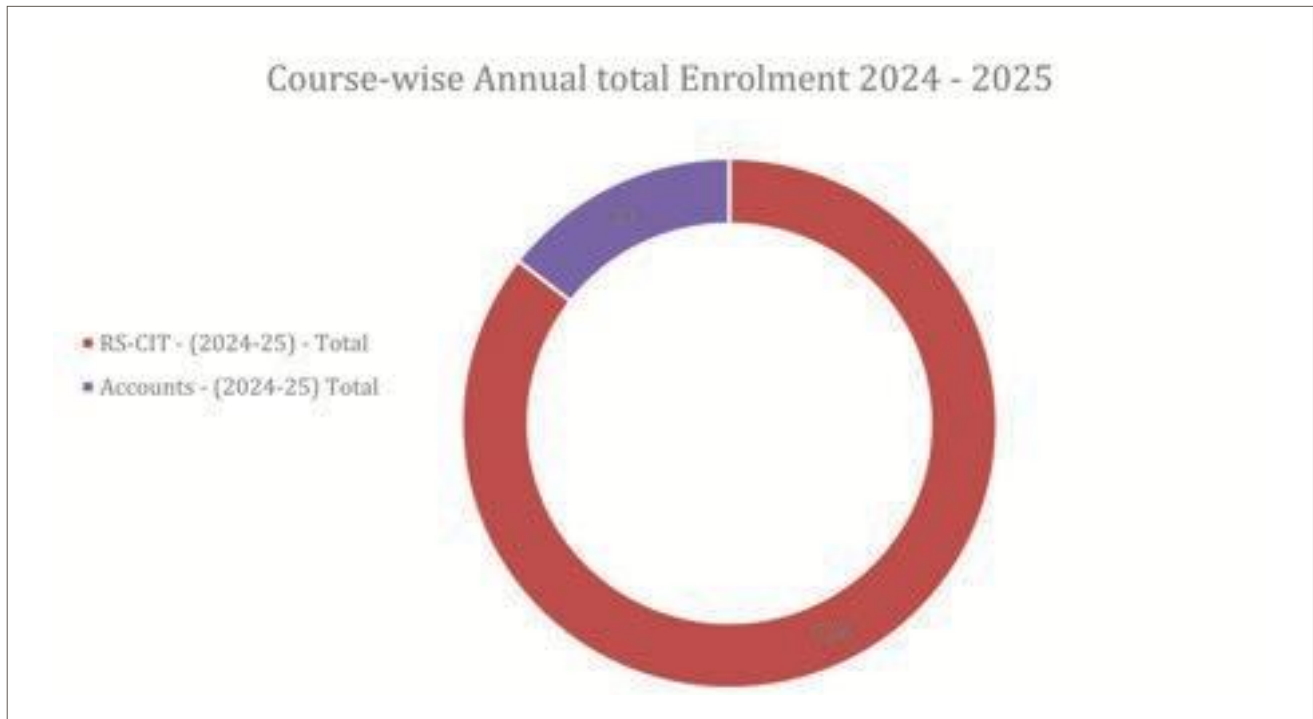
## Annual Achievements

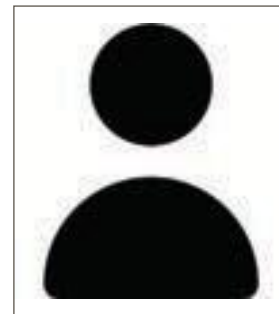

School, Chandoli, aiming to enhance students' understanding of emerging technologies and their practical applications. Through these initiatives, Sapna IT College continues its efforts to empower students with knowledge and skills for a brighter future.



## Promotional Activities

To raise awareness among students in nearby villages, we visited several local schools and carried out various promotional activities. Pamphlets were distributed outside the school premises, and announcements were made through loudspeakers across the villages. As a result of this initiative, some students expressed their interest and willingness to join the IT College.



## Inauguration of WCD Batch

On 15th February 2025, a new batch of the free RS-CIT course for women, under the Mukhyamantri Nari Shakti Prashikshan Evam Kaushal Samvardhan Yojana by the WCD Department, was inaugurated at Sapna IT College, Vijay Mandir, Alwar. The batch, comprising 11 girls, was inaugurated by Upsarpanch Shri Badlu Singh of Thekda Umren.

This government-funded initiative aims to empower women and girls who have completed their 10th-grade education by providing essential IT skills. Shri Badlu Singh encouraged participants to make full use of this opportunity, highlighting the role of digital literacy in enhancing confidence, employability, and social participation. He also commended NGO Sapna for supporting and mobilizing women from rural and underprivileged backgrounds.

Through these efforts, we continue to provide equal learning opportunities for both boys and girls, empowering them to contribute meaningfully to their families and society.

## Impact study

### Rizwana's Success Story

Rizwana is from the village of Naurangabad in Alwar. Her father, Ismail Khan, is a farmer, and her mother is a housewife. Rizwana completed her 10th and 12th from Government High Secondary School, Kagta Basai, scoring 60% and 73.4% respectively.

In July 2025, Rizwana joined Sapna IT College to study RS-CIT and Accounts. She worked hard during her course, and with the support of her teachers, she improved her communication skills and gained confidence. She scored 74% in RS-CIT and a B grade in Accounts.

After completing her course, Rizwana started her first job at Bajaj Finance on 1st March 2025 with a starting salary of Rs. 10,000.

Today, Rizwana is very happy because she can manage her own expenses and is confident in her professional skills. Her hard work, determination, and the guidance she received at Sapna IT College have helped her achieve her goals and build a promising

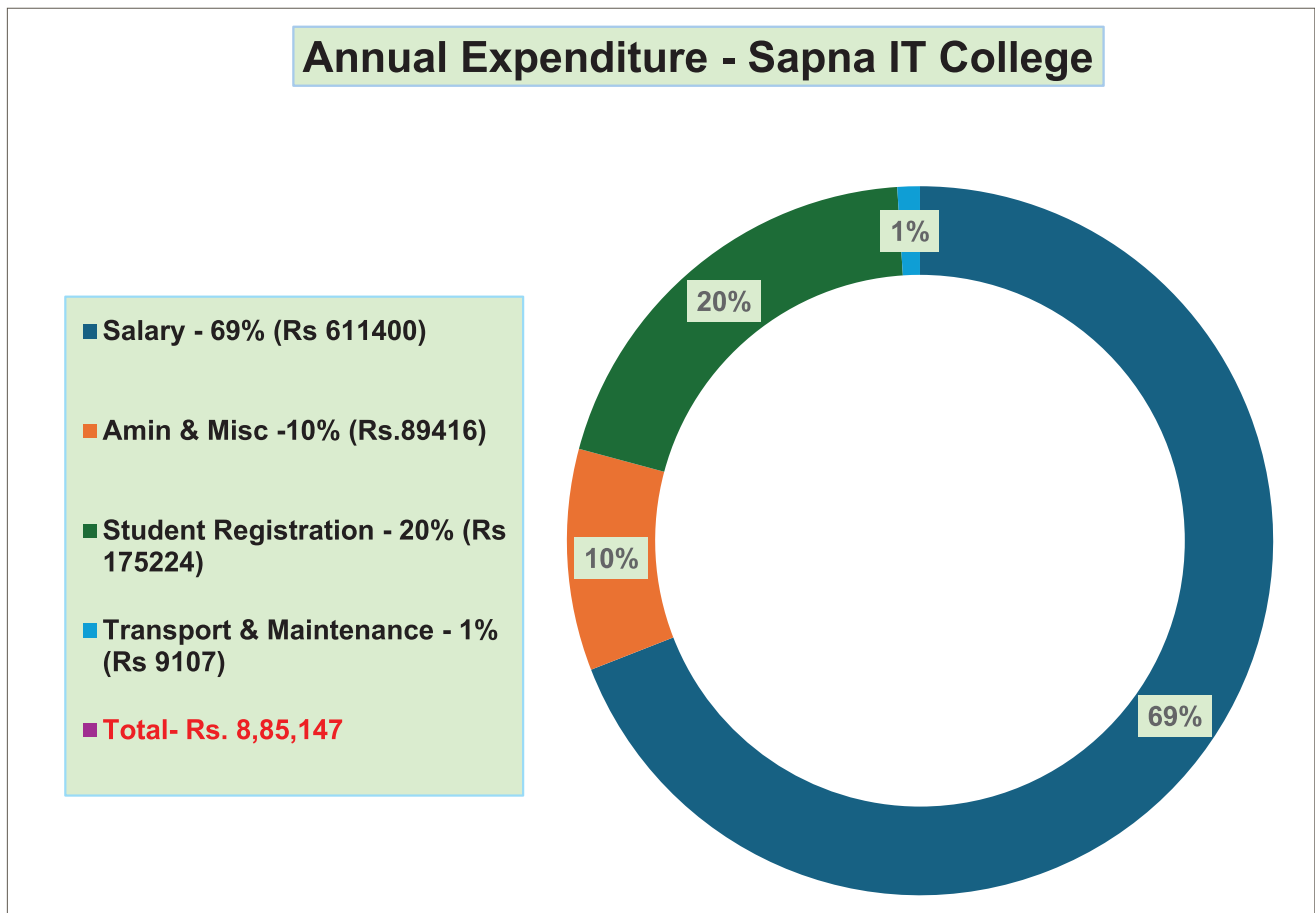

### 3. Computer Literacy Center – Noida

The Computer Literacy Center (CLC) in Noida is another key initiative of Sapna IT College, aimed at providing digital literacy and IT training to marginalized communities, with a special focus on women and girls from the slum area of Nithari, Sector 31, Noida.

Established on 25th December 2023 with the support of Tata Power Community Development Trust and Powerlinks Transmission Limited, the project seeks to bridge the digital divide, enhance employability, and promote gender inclusiveness by empowering disadvantaged individuals with essential IT skills.

#### Objectives

- Bridge the digital divide by providing computer literacy training to women and girls.
- Enhance employability and income-generating potential through acquisition of IT and digital skills.
- Provide a safe and supportive learning environment for women and girls from marginalized communities.
- Facilitate access to information, online resources, and education for greater social inclusion.
- Foster community engagement, leadership, and entrepreneurship among participants.
- The Computer Literacy Center is well-equipped with 20 modern computers, a smart television for audio-visual learning, and qualified trainers who ensure personalized teaching. To promote meaningful learning, the center currently runs three batches of



20 students each, with every course spanning three months and two hours of daily instruction. A token fee is charged to instil ownership and value for the training, and each participant receives a certificate upon successful completion.

### Our Niche in Computer Literacy Course program – Noida

Designed as a safe and secure space exclusively for women and girls, the center offers courses in Basic Computer Skills, Digital Marketing, and Accounts Training.

- Though recently established, the Noida CLC has already begun making a difference by enabling disadvantaged women and girls to gain confidence in using technology, pursue education through online resources, and prepare for employment opportunities in the digital sector.
- Over time, the project will help build a stronger foundation for gender equality, financial independence, and social empowerment in the community.

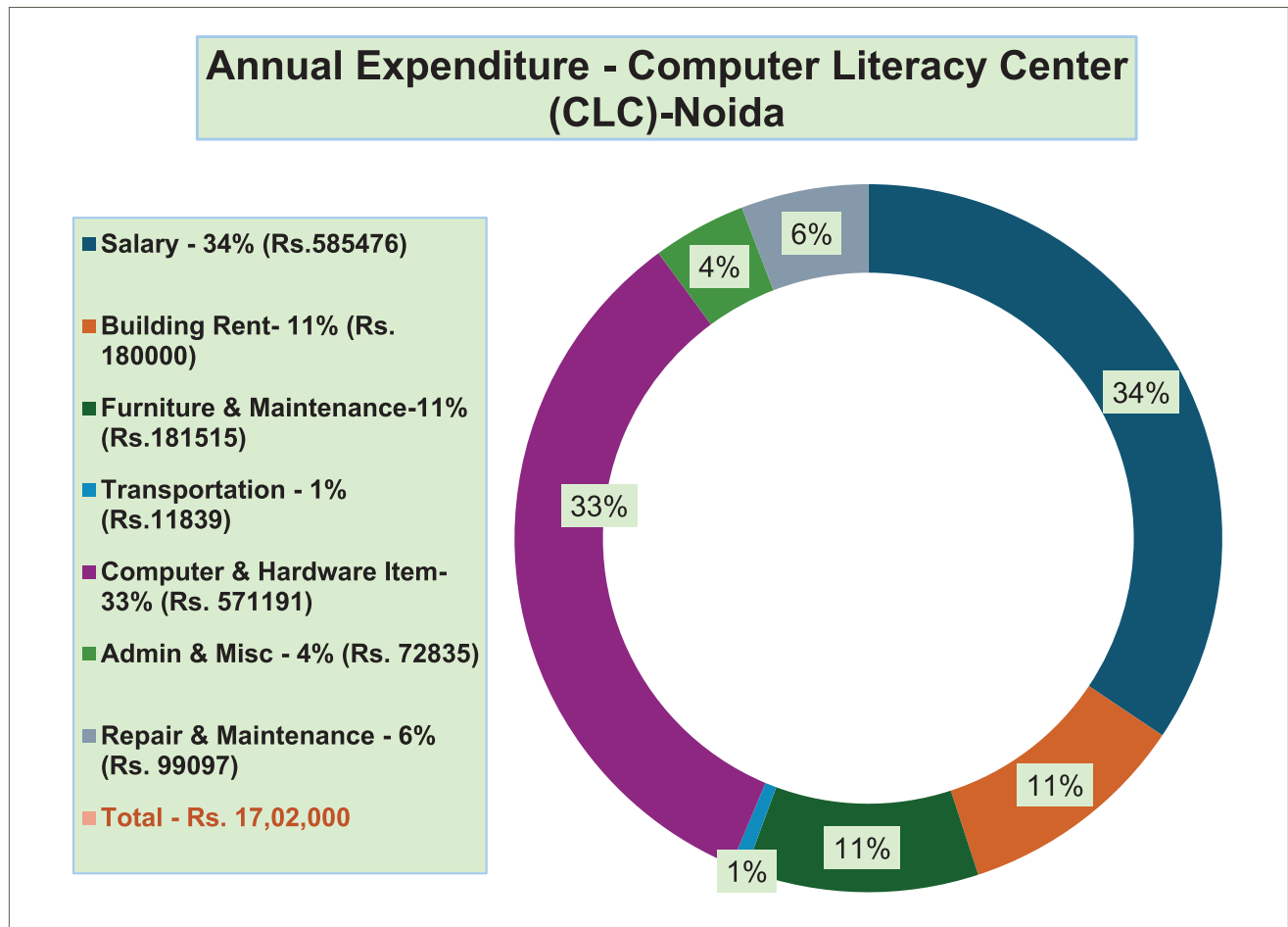

## Almora – CLC program

*Summary: "The project was initiated in partnership with the Dixon Technologies from 1st April 2024 – 31st March 2025. The program aimed at improving basic computer literacy skills of rural youth around Matena, Petshal, Barechina, Dhaulchina villages. The exposure involved introducing students to MS Office and the internet, mail exchange and types of formal communication on the internet within 4 – 5 months, enhancing their capabilities in IT sector."*



### I. Background

The hills of Kumaon are the remote regions of Uttarakhand where today's basic amenities like internet connectivity, availability of smart phones is considered a rarity. The exposure of the target youth to digital world and devices is almost nil. They have probably not seen a computer system let alone used one.

#### a. Project location

The Project was implemented out of four centres as under

- MATENA – The centre was being run from a space provided free of cost by an NGO, which had to be vacated as the NGO was handing the premises back to the State Govt. For a short duration the centre was run from a house and then shifted to the Govt Middle School, where some items were fitted and the centre is now operational from there.
- DHAULCHINA- the center is run from a premises provided by the local " Vyapar Samiti" and only the

cost of electricity is borne through the budget. The centre is attracting many youth and girls for training due to its location.

- PETSAL – A center was established in a rented place close to the Govt School and attracted many youth. After a few months it had to be relocated to another rented room in the same village.
- BARECHINA – A centre was established in a private school with minimal rent being paid. The facility is not used by the school for its students but is open for the needy beneficiaries from the community. Due to proximity to PETSAL only one trainer takes care of training at both the centres.

## 2. Our Work

In the short duration of the implementation of the project the total beneficiaries covered till now are 168, which is significant in terms of numbers and nature of beneficiaries as explained later. It will be prudent to highlight that there is tremendous support from the community for the implementation of the Project and they have provided all possible support.

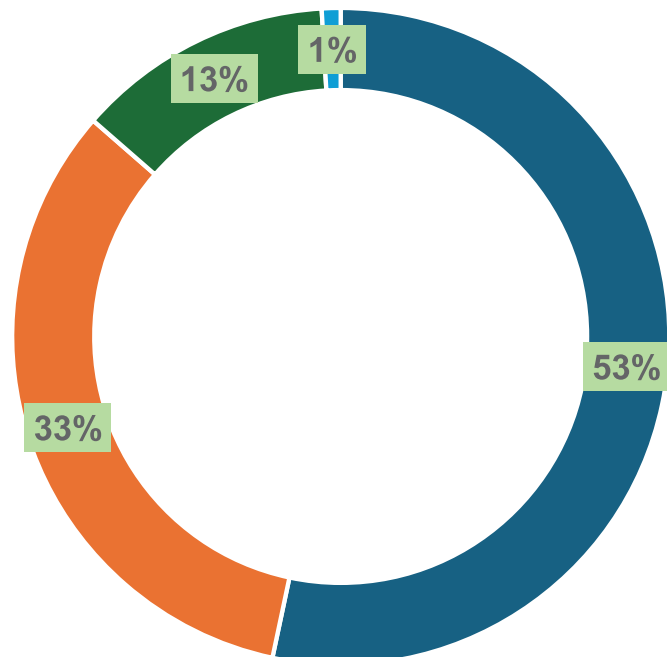

# Livelihood and Skill Development

**Summary:** Sapna's livelihood development projects are designed to create sustainable opportunities for youth, women, and girls by building their core capacities and ensuring long-term employability. Our first initiative, Rural BPO, was launched in 2013 to provide local employment for computer-trained youth and has now evolved into Sapna IT Consultancy. The center not only offers employment but also imparts soft skills and technical training required for the BPO industry. To date, more than 100 rural youth have been employed, and over ₹1.25 crore has been disbursed in wages. The Skill Development Center in Noida focuses on training girls and women from urban slums in stitching and garment-related skills. Our Goat Rearing Project supports rural families by improving livestock management and animal health. So far, 56 families have benefitted from this program.

Together, these initiatives reflect Sapna's commitment to creating self-reliant communities by promoting employability, skill development, and income generation.

## I. Skill Development Center, Noida



The skilling centre for women of Nithari village is in a rented floor of a building in Sector 31. The objective of the program is to technically train women on machines of mass production as well as on various businesses related activities from procurement to marketing of finished goods and provide them sustainable livelihood opportunities.

The courses currently center around tailoring, apparel-making, painting, and embroidery, conducted in two to three batches of 10–12 women each. SAPNA is using a bottom-up approach by engaging members of self-help

groups to identify women in dire need of training. We have also integrated life skills such as communication, decision-making, and strategic thinking into the skilling project to make women confident and self-sufficient.

During FY 2024–25, 90 women and girls were trained at the SDC Center, equipping them with valuable vocational and life skills. The center also enabled 35 women to secure full-time or part-time employment, helping them achieve financial independence, support their families, and build a path toward long-term empowerment.



### Our Niche – SDC

It revolves around two pillars – i) Training; ii) Employment Model.

1. The center combines training in which women receive hands-on training under qualified instructors.
2. Next step is Production where the Centre also takes garment production orders from companies and NGOs. These are executed by trained women under the supervision of trainers. The incomes generated from completed orders is shared among the participating women, offering them direct financial support.

### Mela for Women's & Girls



As part of our **Skill Development Center (SDC) program**, the first health camp was successfully conducted on **22nd–23rd February 2024** at Shaheed Bhagat Singh Park, Sector 31, Noida. This initiative, supported under the CSR program of Tata Power Ltd., aimed to provide essential healthcare services, preventive screenings, and awareness sessions to women and girls from nearby slum areas.

### Medical Services Provided

A dedicated team of doctors and healthcare professionals offered free consultations and screenings, ensuring access to quality healthcare for all participants.

- **Blood Tests:** 250 tests conducted, including thyroid and sugar levels.
- **Vision Screening:** 200 eye check-ups completed, with 20 patients identified for cataract surgery.
- **Medicine Distribution:** Free medicines provided to all patients as prescribed.



## Awareness & Training Sessions

In addition to medical services, the camp also focused on empowering women and girls through practical training and awareness:

- **Self-Defence Training:** Conducted by Knockout Fight Club, with 70 girls participating. Training covered basic combat skills, escaping grabs, and confidence-building techniques.
- **Legal Counselling:** Delivered by advocate Mrs. Shivani Rafiq, benefiting 40 women with guidance on domestic violence, property rights, and women's safety laws.



This initiative combined **healthcare, safety, and legal empowerment**, creating a holistic approach to women's well-being and strengthening the impact of our SDC program in urban slum communities.

## 2. Goat rearing project

In March 2022, NGO Sapna initiated the Goat Rearing Livelihood Program with the objective of improving the annual income impoverished families. This program was undertaken in partnership with Desiccant International Private Limited under their CSR initiative. The primary goal was to identify and support 50 economically disadvantaged families in Dadikar village and neighbouring villages by providing them with 2 goats each.

### Objective

The Objective of the project is to enhance livelihood and income, promote women empowerment as social impact and ensure nutritional benefits through milk production. It has been instrumental in providing the families with economic and physical benefits as well as mental wellness. It has been a source for income, milk and purpose to the elderly for the family.

The program has had a significant impact on the beneficiary families. Several families have seen their goat herds grow beyond the initial two goats, resulting in increased income. Additionally, these goats have provided families with a regular source of milk, benefiting both children and the elderly.

The table above is the indication of the program success. It reports on the economic benefits of goat rearing including milching. IT should be noted that goats distributed, 38% goats gave birth to 86 baby goats, increasing the economic prospects of the owning families.

**Our Niche – Goat Rearing Project**

Since, women are at the forefront of this initiative, “Pashu Sakhis”, are appointed for project implementation, requiring efficient management system to overlook the ground implementation of the project objectives. NGO Sapna has appointed two Pashu Sakhis – women charged with the task of maintenance of the goats and to ensure constant contact with the beneficiary families. They also consider any grievances associated with the beneficiaries regarding health of goats, in pursuance of economic activities such as selling goat milk or guidance in diversifying their income sources etc.

## Impact Study

**Basanti Devi**, from the Keeron Ki Dhani in Hajipur, began her journey with just 2 goats and later received 2 additional goats from Sapna Sanstha. Today, through consistent care and dedication, her herd has grown to over 10 goats. With the support from the organization, Basanti adopted timely preventive healthcare, maintained proper hygiene, and provided adequate shelter for her animals. These good practices helped her expand her herd significantly.

Over the past two years, she has sold male kids worth Rs. 7,000, earned Rs.1,500 from selling one trolley of manure, and met her family's monthly milk needs of 10-15 litre through home consumption.



## 3. Sapna IT Consultancy – BPO



Beginning in 2012, Sapna runs an ambitious rural Business Process Outsourcing (BPO) initiative with a clear mission: to provide gainful employment opportunities to IT skilled youth residing in rural areas.

The objective is to provide employment opportunities to youngsters who have IT skills but are hesitant to leave their villages due to family circumstances and background. Our staff is trained in and manages entire gamut of medical billing and coding services that includes:-

- Medical Billing
- Medical Claims Processing
- Insurance Verification
- Patient Demographics Entry

- Charge Entry
- Claims Submission
- Medical Coding
- Data Entry Work

### **Current Progress**

The BPO currently employs 11 permanent staff. 25 employees (13 girls and 12 boys), who had completed training at Sapna IT College, were employed on a project basis for three months to carry out data entry work.

### **Prospects**

Looking ahead, the BPO aims to expand its operations by outsourcing more projects from corporate clients, thereby increasing the volume and diversity of work handled. This expansion will create greater employment opportunities for rural youth, enabling them to gain market-relevant skills and financial independence. By strengthening training programs and linking them with real-time project work, the BPO envisions establishing a sustainable employment model that not only supports livelihood generation but also contributes to the long-term socio-economic development of rural communities.

# Community Development

## I. Sapno Ka Ghar

NGO Sapna works to uplift the underprivileged sections of society by supporting them in improving their quality of life in various ways. *Sapno Ka Ghar* is one such initiative. The project aims to restore the dignity of beneficiaries by constructing a safe and secure “house” over their heads. This initiative has protected families from extreme weather conditions in the neighbouring villages of Vijay Mandir in Alwar district, such as heatwaves and heavy rainfall. It has also improved their hygiene situation while ensuring better health and a cleaner environment.

*The first Sapno Ka Ghar* was completed in June 2023. Our vision is to construct two such houses every year for the poorest of the poor in the area. The average cost of building one *Sapno Ka Ghar* is about Rs. 3.50 lakhs, with a small contribution taken from the beneficiaries to promote a sense of ownership.

This year, we have constructed two *Sapno Ka Ghar* for the families of Kalu in Dhani Bas and Maya in Hajipur Bas, Alwar district. Both beneficiaries have their own unique stories.

### **Spano Ka Ghar 02**



We embarked on our second endeavor—to provide a home to 45-year-old Kalu from Village Dadhikar Dhani, Alwar, Rajasthan. Kalu, a physically handicapped man, had been struggling for years without a proper home. He, his wife, and their young daughter lived in a single-room dwelling that barely provided shelter. Due to his disability, Kalu was unable to work, making it difficult for the family to sustain themselves. His wife, a determined and hardworking woman, worked as a laborer to fulfill the daily needs of her family. Recognizing Kalu's plight, NGO Sapna decided to build a permanent home for him and his family.

The construction of *Sapno Ka Ghar-02* began in May 2024. The house was designed with a total floor area of 400 square feet, comprising a big room, a kitchen, and an open verandah. On 4th July 2024, *Sapno Ka Ghar-02* was inaugurated by Shri Pratik Juikar, SDM, Alwar, along with other members of NGO Sapna.



## Impact

The new home has brought Kalu and his family dignity, safety, and a sense of stability. It has given them renewed hope and the confidence to look forward to a brighter future.

## Sapno Ka Ghar 03



In our continued effort to bring shelter and dignity to the poorest families in the villages surrounding Vijay Mandir, Alwar, we are proud to share the story of our third Sapno Ka Ghar. This home belongs to Maya—a resilient woman whose story moved us deeply.

Maya, a 40-year-old woman from Hajipur Bas village in Alwar, saw her life take a tragic turn in 2019 when her husband died by suicide, leaving her alone to raise their three young children—an 8-year-old daughter and two

sons aged 10 and 12. In the aftermath of her husband's death, her in-laws refused to support her. With nowhere to turn, Maya and her children lived in a fragile *jhopadi* made of mud and straw, barely able to withstand the changing seasons.

To survive, Maya worked in the fields of others—earning just enough to feed her children, but never enough to build a safe home. The fear of not having a roof over their heads haunted her every day.

Moved by her courage and unyielding spirit, we at SAPNA knew we had to help. On a small patch of land she owned, we built *Sapno Ka Ghar-03*—a permanent and secure house that she and her children could finally call home. The house includes two rooms and a kitchen, covering 450 square feet. It is simple, strong, and filled with warmth.

This third *Sapno Ka Ghar* has been named **Shiv Niketan**, in loving memory of Late Shri Shiv Pratap Singh, father of Shri RRP Singh, Secretary of Sapna. The construction of this house was generously funded by Shri RRP Singh, Smt. Manisha Singh, their daughters Anubhuti Singh and Ishita Singh, and their son-in-law Jeff Rowe.

At SAPNA, we believe that a home is not just a structure of bricks and cement—it is the foundation of a life lived with dignity, safety, and self-worth. *Sapno Ka Ghar* is our commitment to the forgotten, the abandoned, and the brave—like Maya—who deserve a chance to dream again.



## 2. Toilet Construction



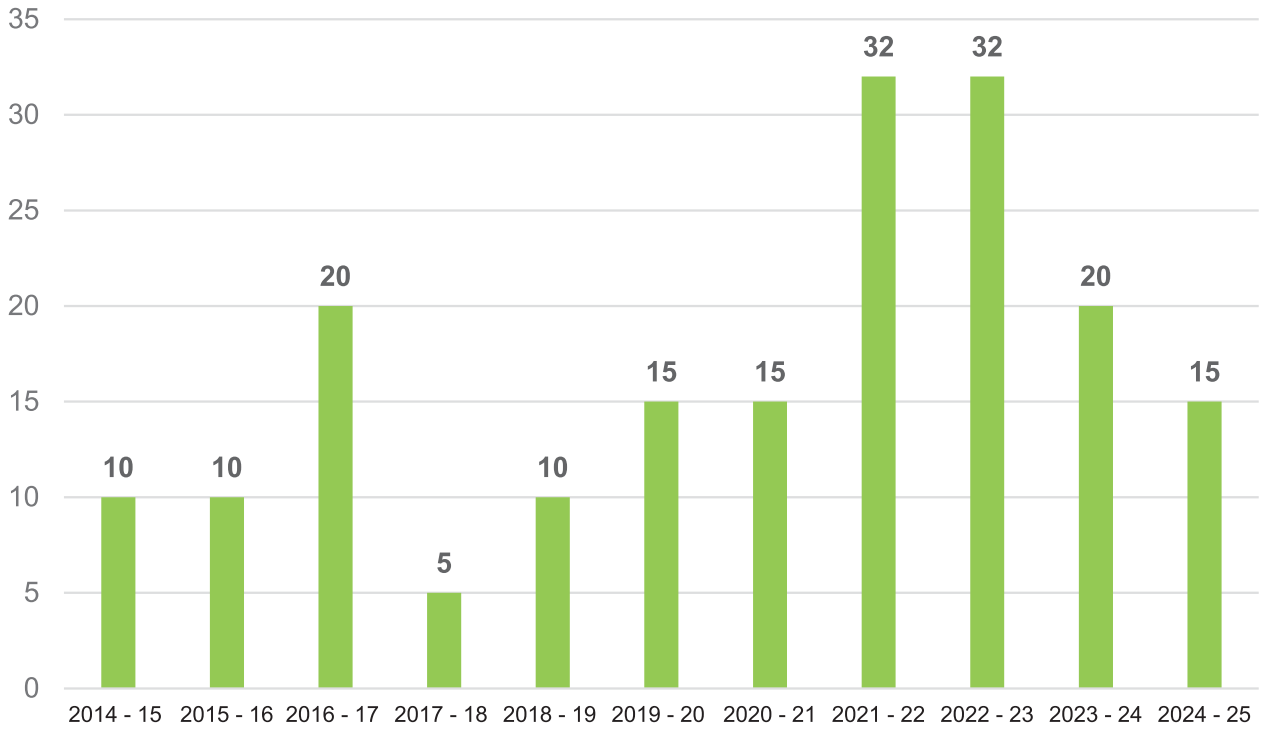
Environment protection and hygiene maintenance are among the core themes of NGO Sapna. Open defecation remains one of the major challenges in our country, and we recognize it as a societal ill that must be eradicated. To put this belief into practice, Sapna has been implementing individual toilet construction projects since 2015 to promote personal and environmental hygiene. A household toilet is not only essential for restoring dignity, privacy, safety, and social status but also plays a vital role in reducing child mortality, improving maternal health, supporting primary education, advancing gender equity, ensuring environmental sustainability, and enhancing the overall quality of life.

During the year 2024–25, we constructed 15 toilets, taking our total to 185 toilets built so far in this region. Our vision is to ensure that every household without a toilet gains access to one, thereby eliminating open defecation from the area.

Each toilet costs around Rs. 55,000 to construct, with beneficiaries contributing Rs. 10,000 to encourage ownership and responsibility.

We remain deeply grateful to our donors, Bry Air (Asia) Pvt. Ltd. and Desiccant Rotors International Pvt. Ltd., for their unwavering support of this project under their CSR initiatives.

### 3. Solar Street Lights Project – Village Dadikar



In continuation of our commitment to community development, NGO Sapna undertook another impactful initiative in Village Dadikar—the installation of solar street lights. A total of 40 solar street lights were installed along the main road of the village, significantly enhancing the safety and ease of movement for residents, especially during the night.

The project has already begun to transform daily life in the village. The well-lit roads provide a sense of security, encourage community interaction after dark, and reduce the risk of accidents and theft. The feedback from villagers has been overwhelmingly positive, reflecting the real and immediate difference the initiative has brought to their lives.



Each solar street light is equipped with a 75-watt solar panel, 30 AH battery, and 30-watt LED light, with a backup capacity of 6-7 hours over two nights. The system also includes an auto day-night sensor and is certified with IP65/66 standards, ensuring durability and reliability.

We are deeply grateful to Desiccant Rotors International Pvt. Ltd. for supporting this initiative under their CSR program.

## 4. Jan Seva Kendra

*Jan Seva Kendra (E-Mitra center) was opened to the public at Vijay mandir in 2010. The E-Mitra center is a holistic scheme of Government of Rajasthan under their e-governance programme, implemented using Public-Private Partnership (PPP). The programme aims to improve the transparency and convenience of citizens to obtain various services from government and private sector under one roof using an e-platform.*



### A) Our services

1. Cards – Voter ID, PAN, Ration, Jan Aadhaar, Ayushman, Labor
2. Forms – Pension, Police Verification, Scholarship
3. Certificates – Caste, Income, Residence, Life, Birth
4. Bills – Utility bill payments
5. The center provides the above services, among others.

The services provided by JSK in FY 2004 – 2025 reveals the common categories of services used by people throughout the year including all four quarters. They include Caste certificate, Mool Niwas, print certificate, Jan Aadhaar and Pension Verification.

# Environment and Water Conservation

*Summary: At NGO Sapna, we believe that protecting the environment and conserving natural resources is central to building a sustainable future for rural communities. Our initiatives focus on improving ecological balance, strengthening water security, and promoting sustainable farming practices. Under this theme, we run three key programs—Tree Plantation and Sapna Nursery, Construction of Check Dams, and the Agriculture Resource Center. Together, these initiatives not only contribute to restoring the environment but also enhance livelihoods, ensure water availability, and create long-term resilience for the communities we serve.*

## I. Sapna Nursery and Plantation Initiative

Mahatma Gandhi's love for nature and his emphasis on "cleanliness as next to Godliness" has been deeply embodied in the work culture of Sapna. Our commitment to environmental protection and cleanliness is not just a program, but a way of life.

To strengthen this commitment, Sapna established its own nursery in 2017, with the dual aim of growing plants cost-effectively for our needs and providing saplings to villagers at a nominal cost. Since its inception, more than 7,000 saplings have been planted across the region. Despite the harsh summers, erratic rainfall, and the arid soil of Alwar, the survival rate of these plantations has been encouraging, highlighting the determination of both Sapna and the community.



### 2024–25 Plantation Drive

During the year, a total of 1000 saplings were planted and 250 saplings were distributed to promote greenery:

1. **Dadikar Village:** 550 Plantation near check dams and adjoining forest areas.
2. **Bala Dehra Village:** 250 saplings planted near the newly constructed check dam.

3. **Sapna Shikshalaya Campus:** 100 saplings planted to enrich the school environment.
4. **Vijay Mandir Campus:** 100 saplings planted at Vijay Mandir Tekri Area.
5. **Sapna Shikshalaya Girls:** 250 saplings distributed to students, encouraging them to take responsibility for nurturing trees in their homes and villages.

### Forest Development under CSR

Sapna has also developed forests with CSR support:

1. DRI Forest at Vijay Mandir (supported by *Desiccant Rotors International Pvt. Ltd.*)
2. Bry Air Forest at Dadikar (supported by *Bry Air (Asia) Pvt. Ltd.*)

The Bry Air forest has 1200 trees now and DRI Forest has 500 trees now and more will be planted in future. Both sites will soon transform into sustainable green zones.



### Impact

Alwar district lies in the Aravalli foothills, a region classified as semi-arid with scanty rainfall, high groundwater depletion, and increasing desertification risks. Plantation and afforestation in this fragile ecosystem have far-reaching impacts:

1. **Groundwater Recharge:** Tree roots enhance percolation and reduce surface runoff, complementing Sapna's water conservation projects.
2. **Soil Protection:** Trees help combat erosion and restore fertility to degraded lands.
3. **Climate Resilience:** Increased green cover reduces heat, improves microclimates, and supports biodiversity.
4. **Community Awareness:** Distributing saplings to villagers and schoolgirls encourages ownership and long-term care, ensuring sustainability.

By combining water conservation (check dams) with green initiatives (nursery, plantations, forests), Sapna is creating a synergistic model for environmental restoration in Alwar.

## 2. Water Conservation (Construction of Check Dams)

Alwar district in Rajasthan falls under the dark/grey zone for groundwater, with the region facing acute water scarcity for decades. Rain-fed agriculture, erratic monsoons, and the over-extraction of groundwater have worsened the situation, leaving villagers struggling for drinking water as well as irrigation. To address this critical challenge, Sapna has been making continuous efforts to conserve water, recharge groundwater, and improve water availability through community-based water harvesting structures.

### Past Initiatives

In 2020, Sapna embarked on its water conservation journey by initiating the construction of check dams in village Dadhikar. With generous CSR support from Bry Air Pvt. Ltd. and Desiccant Rotors International Pvt. Ltd., and with the support from villagers one earthen check dam and two concrete check dams were constructed in village Dadhikar, Alwar significantly improving water retention capacity. These dams not only replenished borewells and ponds that had been dry for years but also enabled villagers to grow crops such as wheat, barley, and mustard. The success of these projects underscored the importance of collective action by NGOs, corporate partners, and the community.

Continuing this effort, Sapna successfully constructed its fourth check dam in village Bala Dehra, Alwar, inaugurated on 28th August 2024.

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## Our Commitment

Sapna remains committed to its mission of saving, collecting, and recharging water resources to mitigate the water crisis in Alwar's grey-zone areas. With each new dam, we move closer to building a sustainable solution to water scarcity, ensuring that communities have reliable access to this most vital resource.

We remain grateful to our partner Bry Air (Asia) Pvt Ltd and the villagers for their cooperation, trust, and participation in this shared journey of water conservation.

## Impact

This year, the dam collected a substantial volume of rainwater. Villagers reported that 20–25 borewells and nearby ponds that were dry earlier have now been recharged. The structure has already begun to make a meaningful impact on the local community by improving access to water for irrigation and household use. With further deepening planned, the capacity of the dam will increase, enabling even greater recharge in the coming years.

## 3. Sustainable Agriculture Resource Center – Village Dadikar

On 5th June 2023 (World Environment Day), NGO Sapna inaugurated the Sustainable Agriculture Resource Center in village Dadikar, a CSR initiative generously supported by Desiccant Rotors International Pvt. Ltd.

The center is dedicated to promoting sustainable and eco-friendly farming practices in Alwar's semi-arid region. It serves as both a production unit and a knowledge hub, where farmers are encouraged to adopt organic supplements to improve soil fertility and crop productivity.



## Key Activities & Production

The center produces three natural agricultural supplements:

- Vermicompost (organic manure)
- Neemstra (natural pesticide & soil enhancer)
- Jeevamitra (bio-fertilizer for soil health)

The facility includes five vermicompost pits, each cycle having the capacity to produce:

- 1,000 kg of vermicompost
- 1,000 liters of neemstra
- 1,000 liters of jeevamitra

During 2024–25, the center produced a total of 3,000 kg of vermicompost, part of which was sold to local farmers and markets, generating income to ensure the financial sustainability of the project.



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### Inauguration of Medicinal Garden

On 28th August 2024, a Medicinal Garden was inaugurated at Village Dadhikar, Alwar (Rajasthan). The garden includes plants such as Tulsi, Aloe Vera, Neem, Bel, Siris, Palash, Amaltas, Lisoda, Shisham, Amla, Bargad, Gular, Peepal, Papadi, Sahejana, Khejri, and Imli.



## Farmer Training & Awareness

We take our initiative seriously with a focus on long term impact. Hence we train the farmers in:

- Techniques of preparing vermicompost, neemstra, and jeevamitra
- Benefits of organic farming for soil health, water conservation, and long-term crop yields
- Reducing dependency on chemical fertilizers and pesticides



## Prospects

- Training Hub: Expand the center into a full-fledged agriculture training facility, where farmers can learn sustainable techniques, modern practices, and organic farming models.
- Kitchen Gardens: Promote kitchen gardens in village households, encouraging families to grow vegetables and fruits for self-consumption. Surplus produce will be sold in local markets, creating additional livelihood opportunities for rural families.

# Women Empowerment

**Summary:** Mahila Suraksha and Seva Kendra in Alwar and Bhiwadi operate along with the local police to provide legal support to women victims of domestic violence. The reported cases span from social issues of domestic and physical violence to cases related to custody, divorce and family disputes. Our teams at both the centers work towards guiding women to right direction in accordance with the nature of their complaints. At NGO Sapna, we believe that protecting the environment and conserving natural resources is central to building a sustainable future for rural communities. Our initiatives focus on improving ecological balance, strengthening water security, and promoting sustainable farming practices. Under this theme, we run three key programs— Tree Plantation and Sapna Nursery, Construction of Check Dams, and the Agriculture Resource Center. Together, these initiatives not only contribute to restoring the environment but also enhance livelihoods, ensure water availability, and create long-term resilience for the communities we serve.

MSSK Alwar operation is driven by two counsellors and one police constable. MSSK Alwar is supervised by Ms. Phoolvati and Ms. Nidhi (2024 – 25) Similarly, in MSSK Bhiwadi the center is managed by two counsellors. Ms. Deepti oversees the MSSK Bhiwadi center along with Ruksena

## I. Mahila Suraksha and Seva Kendra, Alwar



NGO Sapna has been active in reducing the violence against women. In the pursuance of the same, the 'Mahila Suraksha Evam Salah Kendra (MSSK)', a holistic redressal centre for women has been operational since 2008 by partnering with local police and Department of Women and Child in Alwar, Rajasthan. Its operations include to assist women in:-

1. To negotiate their way through the Criminal Justice System
2. Settling disputes through alternative dispute resolution mechanisms
3. Rehabilitation to women survivors of violence; and
4. Providing medical and legal aid, psycho-social support, shelter, economic rehabilitation, and any other relief required.

**Outcome** - Our center helps women to navigate their concerns without involving police for smooth resolution of the issues. In FY 2024 – 2025, highest type of cases received includes-Family disputes involving conflicts between female victim and husband/mother-in-law/brother-in-law etc. (24.4% of the total). While the lowest type of case received in FY 2024 – 2025 involves Sexual harassment and Marriage related (2.6% each). On the other hand, dowry related cases ranked in 2nd in FY 2024 – 2025. Our MSSK counsellors have successfully resolved all the cases received in FY 2024 – 2025.

Another center for women empowerment and in the same line of thought was opened in Bhiwadi. The MSSK Bhiwadi also deals with cases pertaining to women harassment and other social issues concerning them.

**Outcome** - In Bhiwadi, 3rd party related violence topped the list followed by issues concerning monetary situations and, on the 3rd, place it is followed by kidnapping. This is in contrast to zero kidnapping cases received at MSSK center, Alwar. Our MSSK counsellors at Bhiwadi center have successfully resolved all the cases received in FY 2024 – 2025.

### Our Niche - Mahila Suraksha and Seva Kendra

Our core values

1. The counsellors listen patiently to victims' problem. Every case is unique and requires a different resolution strategy.
2. Every strategy depends on the gravity and nature of grievance. Need of survivor and confidentiality are the two main core values on which our work is based.

### Case Study

**Kiran Devi** resident of Dehli Dakhaza, visited **MSSK Alwar** on 2nd April 2024, with a complaint of family dispute. Married for 7 years, she has been living on her own for the last 3 years, on rent with her son. She said that she was married along with her sister to the same house. However, her sister refused to come live with her husband. This prompted her husband and the entire family to show her the door. However, her sister remains adamant to not come to her husband. Kiran pleaded with the counsellor to convince her husband as she wants to

live with at her in-law's house. The counsellor arranged a joint meeting on 3rd April 2024 with all parties involved, and successfully convinced her husband to take Kiran back in.

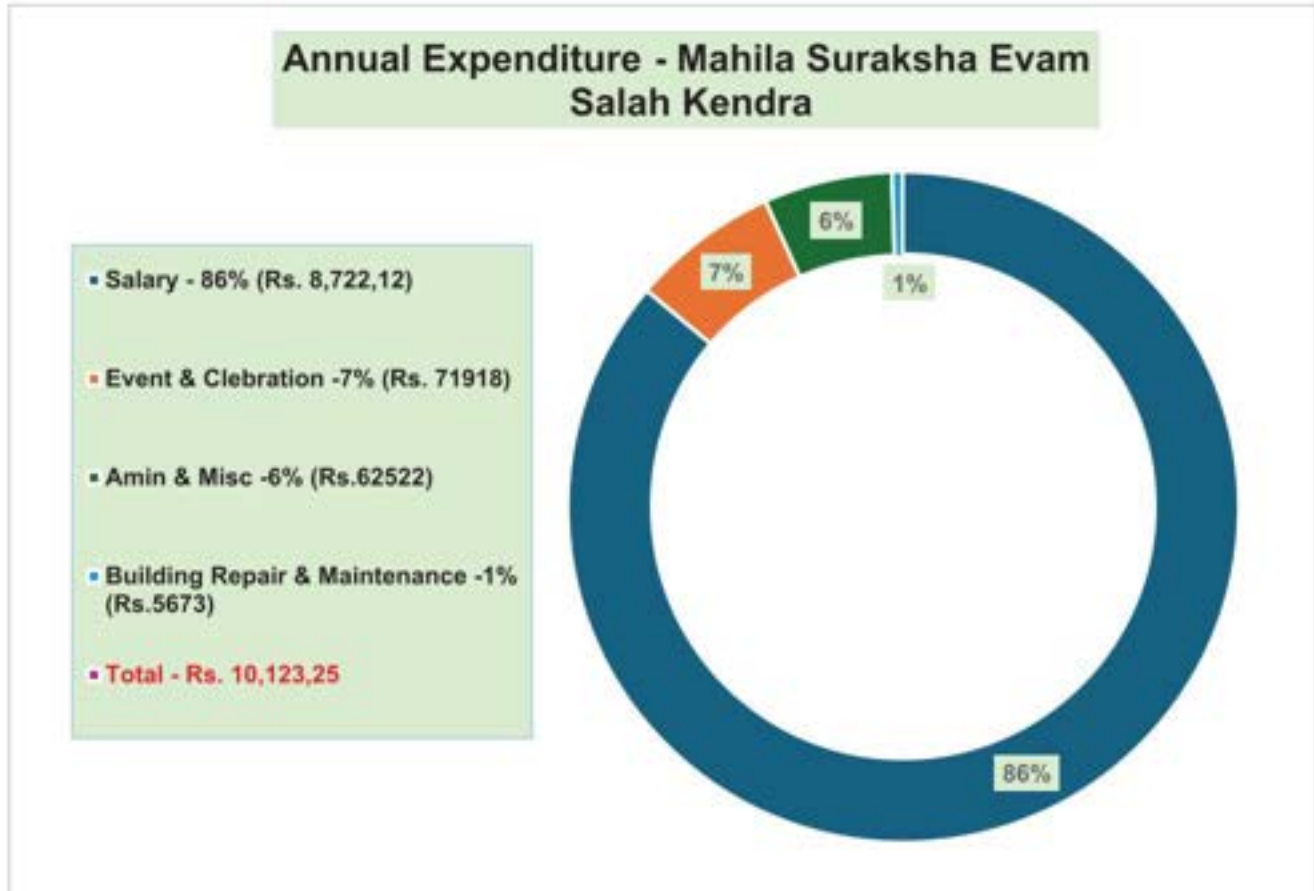


The meeting ended in agreement with all sides, and as the husband remarked “I will take care of her from now on”, they left the center in peace. On follow up visit Kiran said that “Everything is fine now, they keep me nicely, your efforts has made my household.”

On 26th December 2024 **Draupdi Devi**, resident of Ghevar Baas, Kervada, Rajgarh Tehsil, Alwar district, Rajasthan. She came to the **MMSK center, Bhiwadi** with the complaint of domestic abuse by her husband. While she mentioned that she is 69 years, she routinely struggles to live peacefully in her house. According to her account, she is subjected to derogatory and foul language, accused of stealing by her husband. She is highly concerned about her household. She urges the center social worker to kindly intervene as soon as possible. Center social worker promptly contacted the husband to arrange a joint consultation in very next day. The following day, after the mediation, Draupdi's husband implored the MSSK worker to give him 2nd chance. After years of tolerating such abuse, Draupdi pressed for a divorce stating that she is tired of this and just want to live in peace.” Th social worker encouraged the couple to not go for divorce as the consequences might be hard considering their age. It required patient pursual on the side of MSSK worker to encourage Draupdi to shift to her brother's house for a change – for a month. As both agreed, fast forward, the case was resolved with Draupdi returning and her husband accepting not to abuse her anymore. Draupdi thanked the center and the social worker, for saving her family.

### Financial Overview

The grand total expenditure for MSSK, both centers combined for the FY 2024 – 2025 has been Rs. 10,123,25. The pie charts below highlight the detailed overview expenses of combined MSSK centers – Alwar and Bhiwadi.

## Human Resources

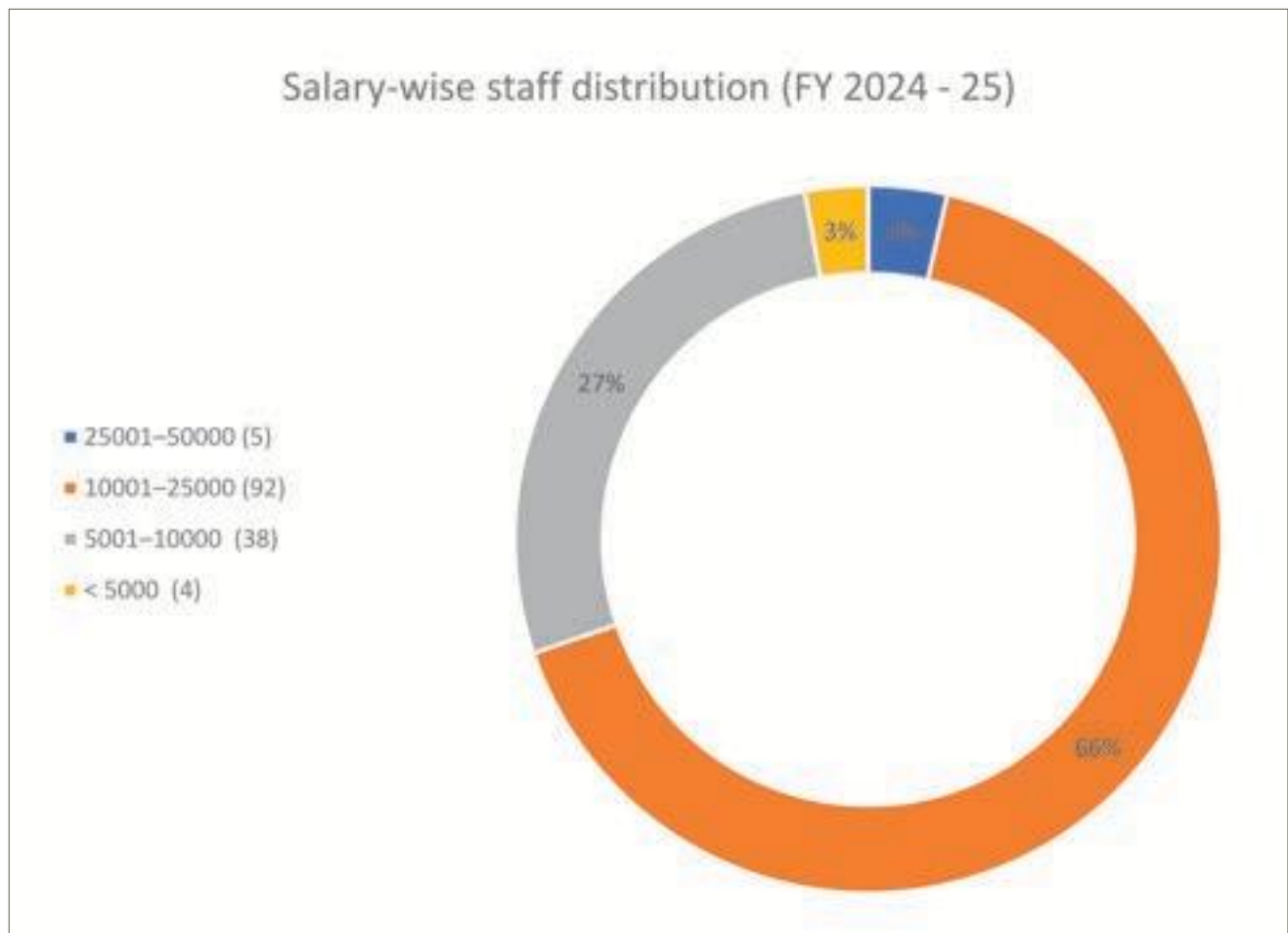
